Hometown talent wasn't outshone by the visitors. The Klamath Chorus, directed by Johnny Houston and Benny Loftsgaard, did a splendid job in two featured spots. A novelty number, with Wilbur Stiles portraying Ragtime Joe at a battered old upright piano, was particularly enjoyable.

It would be foolish to try and select the number one quartet. The Medford Novelists opened the show in bangup style. Berkeley's Uncalled Four rated several

encores as did Bly's House Brothers, the Sacramento Statesmen, the Travelaires from San Jose and the ever-popular Lake Oswego Four. Other quartets were the Reno Silver Sisters, the Evergreens from Yakima and Tulcaires of Tulelake.

Bob Perkins, as emcee, wowed the audience with a specialty including his famed "Blood on the Saddle" stunt.

It was a grand show and a distinct credit to the Klamath men who put it together.

By way of making the evening a complete success, Charles Bane, president of the Klamath Barbershoppers, announced the show had raised \$3,500 for Boy Scout, Girl Scout and Camp Fire Girl camping funds.

Horse Hurt In Pasture

WEED—A valuable animal termed in racing parlance a "quarter horse" was severely injured last Saturday night in the pasture of the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Henry M. Maxzini, of the Double M Ranch three miles south of Weed.

The 14 months old stallion had just been brought from Southern California where it had been purchased through the manager of the Shadow Valley breeding farm. It was turned out in the small pasture with the other horses on the ranch. The ranch horses were familiar with the pasture and turned at the corner of the fence, when running, but this horse failed to make the turn and a barbed wire came with in a fraction of a second of severing the jugular vein in his neck. It also received some bad cuts on the shoulder.

The horse is eligible for showing at the Cow Palace in September in which the owners plan to enter him. Mrs. Maxzini stated yesterday that the doctor believes the wounds will be healed and the planned entry made possible.
