**RNA To Aid Red Cross**

Camp No. 9898, Royal Neighbors of America, of Klamath Falls, is participating in a nationwide patriotic project of fraternal benefit societies to obtain funds which will be presented to the American Red Cross with the suggestion that the money be used for the purchase of a number of mobile units for gathering blood for the boys in military service and for civilian needs.

The project, sponsored by the National Fraternal Congress of America, calls on the 85,000 local lodges of its member societies, throughout the United States and Canada, to contribute cash.

In announcing the project to camps of Royal Neighbors of America Supreme Oracles Frances L. Torkelson of Rock Island, Ill., called attention to the great need for blood for boys in service.

The English actress is going all out for the role. She happily posed for the first bathing suit photos of her Hollywood career.

"No, I've never done cheesecake before," she admitted. "For one thing, nobody at MGM ever asked me to. I'm not sure I would have done it anyway. I don't see much advantage in my posing for photos in all kinds of scanty attire."

"But in this picture it's different. I actually have some scenes in shorts and bathing suits. There is a reason for it in the script."

Miss Kerr remarked that she got typed from the start of her Hollywood career in the queenlike kind of role. Her first film here was "The Hucksters" opposite Clark Gable.

"Any actress who comes over here from England has something of a disadvantage, as far as the choice of roles is concerned," she said. "As soon as you arrive, they place a tiara on your head and expect you to act like royalty at all times."

I asked her how she managed to break through the typing barrier and land the "Eternity" role.

"I changed my agents," she reported. "I told my new one, 'I'm going to sack you if you don't go out and get me a role that will prove I have some red blood in my veins, not ice water.'"

"He's an imaginative fellow and dreamed up the idea that I should play in 'From Here to Eternity.' When he suggested the idea to (Columbia boss) Harry Cohn, Cohn ordered him out of the office. Two days later, Cohn said, 'Can we get her?'"

Miss Kerr landed the part without even testing for it. She admitted the producers took a chance in going against the trend.

"In this town, you play two of the same kind of parts and you are forever thought of in that kind of role," she said. "But when you consider the films I did in England, you'll find that I have done just about every kind of part."

"I have done everything but the Marilyn Monroe sort of thing, and I'd look pretty silly trying that."

She is now playing an Army officer's wife who carries on with enlisted men.

"Actually she is a very tragic figure," Miss Kerr reported. "I don't know if she is ladylike and carry it when they learn the truth. That's why the thought I might be all the role."
