Three alleged thugs, one of whom is reported to have posed as an FBI agent, were in jail Tuesday after brutal assaults on two Klamath Falls residents.

Held pending filing of complaints by the District Attorney are Lester Barton, 46, Loren Barton, 31, and Kenneth Gardner, 31. Loren Barton is in the county jail. The other two suspects are held by city police.

Short Rites Held Monday

Hundreds of friends paid last respects to Aviation Cadet William Donald (Billy) Short at military services held yesterday in the Mt. Lahi Community Church. The young flyer lost his life April 8 in the collision of two T-33 jet planes during a training maneuver in Arizona.

Graveside services were conducted by VFW Post No. 1383 directed by Post Commander Keith Walrath and Chaplain Harvey Brannan. Daniel Peck was in charge of the firing squad.

The young cadet was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Short of the Henley District.

Ex-GI Admits Spy Plot

WASHINGTON (U.S.) — Kurt L. Ponger, an Austrian-born former GI, pleaded guilty Tuesday to conspiracy to spy on U. S. defense secrets for Communist Russia.

Ponger, 39, entered his plea 24 hours after Otto Verber, his co-defendant and brother-in-law, pleaded guilty to the spy conspiracy.

Ponger pleaded guilty to a charge which government lawyers said carried a possible death penalty. But the prosecutors, in effect, waived any possibility of the extreme penalty for Ponger.

As a result, Ponger faces a maximum sentence of 20 years, twice the time Verber could receive.

Verber and Ponger are former residents of New York. They were living in Austria at the time of their arrest in January. They were flown here for trial.

Ponger pleaded guilty to conspiring with Verber and a former official of the Russian embassy in transit to Soviet officials in the two countries information concerning American defense secrets.

The Russian, Yuri Novikov, left for home after the U. S. ruled he was not acceptable as a diplomatic envoy.

Ponger entered his plea to the first count of the indictment, while Verber pleaded guilty to the second count charging a conspiracy to gather defense secrets with intent of having them transmitted to Russia.

4 Injured In Accidents

Four Klamath Falls men were hospitalized today by a series of mishaps while at work.

Apparently the most serious case was that of John Soto, 31, 1827 Main Street, who suffered a severe cut on his left thigh at the Car-Ad-Co mill early this morning.

Soto was reported to have been injured when a power saw he was using slipped. At Klamath Valley Hospital, attendants said surgery would be necessary. His condition was reported as good, however.

Late yesterday afternoon, C. E. Homer, 43, 3703 Emerald, suffered a heart attack while at work on construction of the new hardboard plant at the Weyerhaeuser mill. At Hillside Hospital today his condition was reported as improved and he was not considered to be in critical condition.

Walter Killian, 40, 5776 Harlan Drive, was placed aboard a train here last night to be taken to St. Francis Hospital, San Francisco. Killian, a Railway Express messenger, suffered a back injury while working his car on a train between here and Redmond several days ago. His physician ordered him to the hospital for special treatment.

Late this morning, Lyle Downing, new member of the Herald and News editorial staff, wrenched his left knee as he stepped backwards at an elevated doorway in the publisher's office. He was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital. All four cases were transported by Kaler ambulance.

Search On For Lake Victims

Upper Klamath Lake waters were being searched in the vicinity of Eagle Ridge today for bodies of two victims of the boating tragedy in that area April 4.

The body of 4-year-old Connie Rae Sykes was recovered about 6 a.m. April 5, some 12 hours after the accident. Still missing are the bodies of the little girl's brother, Victor, 10, and Nils Nelson, about 70.

Early the evening of April 5, the small cruiser of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Sykes, Harriman Lodge owners and operators, was swamped by a big wave about 75 yards off the tip of Eagle Ridge.

Mr. and Mrs. Sykes and their two older youngsters, Mavon, 12, and Raymond Jr., 11, managed to make shore. Five search boats, manned by their owners and volunteer crews, searched the wild and icy waters all night for possible survivors but only the lifeless body of little Connie Ray, supported by a lifejacket, was found.

Because of the low temperature of the water it was unlikely bodies would come to the surface for several days following the accident. Neither Raymond Jr. nor Nelson had lifejackets.

Today, four men returned to the tragedy scene in Fred Fleet's cruiser. They were to drag the lake and research the shoreline.

With Fleet, were his son, Frank, Deputy Sheriff Dale Matton and State Patrolman Larry Willis. Sheriff Murray Britton said that they would also ascertain the water depth in view of the possibility of having a diver seek the bodies.

Woman Killed In Freak Accident

Buell said the husband, Ellisworth M. Tullar, 20, said this happened:

He was sitting on the davenport repairing the gun with the couple's 10-month-old child beside him. The child started to fall and Tullar grabbed for it. The gun fell to the floor and discharged, the bullet striking Mrs. Tullar in the chest.

Buell said there would be no inquest.

The Tullar home is in the Cedar Creek area, seven miles west of here.
