School Board Fires Six

ROSEBURG (AP) — The school board here refused Monday night to disclose publicly its reasons for not rehiring six teachers and for placing nine others on probation.

At a meeting attended by approximately 400 persons, Supt. M. C. Deller read a prepared statement saying the board was not obligated by law to tell why the teachers weren't rehired.

Robert Rowe, a representative of the AFL American Federation of Teachers, asked the board to call the meeting after the 15 teachers were notified a month ago of the action taken against them.

Warren Ewing, one of the teachers not being rehired, and John Gussie and Walt Buss, who were placed on probation, spoke. They contended the action was unjust because they had not been notified of the reasons for it.

After the meeting Deller told reporters that the teachers would be individually notified in writing of the reasons for the board's action.

Most of the spectators were sympathetic with the teachers and applauded their talks. The board's statement was booed.

Filbert Men Demand Action

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Agriculture was asked Monday to renew its recommendation to President Eisenhower for quotas on imported filberts.

Rep. Harris Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said that Agriculture Secretary Benson has recommended the quotas which would prevent possible "dumping" of some 16 million pounds of nuts on U. S. markets by Turkish growers. He added that the State Department is opposing the quotas.

Ellsworth said that if the Turkish growers were permitted to dump their nuts on the American market, U. S. prices would drop and domestic growers would then be entitled to subsidies under the price support program.
