

City Council Gets Big List Building Permits; OK's Closing Of Earl Street

pair needs submitted by City Engineer E. A. Thomas was taken under advisement by the council. Thomas estimated it will cost approximately \$124,647 to repair streets damaged resulting from winter storms and to rebuild Klamath Avenue from 2nd to Center.

A permit for closing Earl St. at 415 Main St. was referred to the police committee for further investigation after Police Chief Orville Hamilton told the council that previous dances at that location had disturbed patients in nearby Klamath Valley Hospital.

"These were just ordinary dances," the chief explained. "I understand that it is the intention of this applicant to stage square dances. During the summer months with the windows all open for ventilation, the noise will probably be great."

Application of a religious organization known as Young Soldiers of Christ to conduct meetings on Main St. was ordered investigated by the mayor and the police committee.

City Engineer Thomas was authorized to close Earl St. from Esplanade to El Dorado. This action was taken at the request of City Recreation Director Bob Bonney and City Recreation Board. It was pointed out that the street extends along one side of a city playground. Bonney said the street was not important to traffic and should be closed as a safety measure as well as to permit enlargement of the playground.

The council authorized advertising for bids for construction of restrooms at Fairview playground. Cost of construction will be shared by Elementary School District No. 1 and the city.

A report for 1952 from the Klamath Falls Garbage Co. showing an income of \$99,831 and franchise fee of \$750 was accepted by the council.

It was announced that the city will receive bids until April 27 on equipment in the airport boiler-house.

Police Use Clubs; Put Down Riot

TEHRAN, Iran (U) — Police used tear gas and clubs to smash demonstrations in downtown Tehran Tuesday over Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's attempts to wrest control of the Army from the shah.

But the Majlis—lower house of Parliament—failed by one member to raise a quorum and thus delayed until Thursday any legislative action on Mossadegh's proposal to curb the powers of Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlevi, including Army control.

An atmosphere of explosive excitement gripped the city after an announcement by a group of Army officers Monday night threatening an armed revolt to protect the monarchy.

The crowds defied a military ban on demonstrations. They included supporters of both Mossadegh and the shah.

Morning newspapers carried the text of the officers' announcement, which described Mossadegh as a "foxy, stubborn old man" and declared the authors would "leave our service and together will rise."

mobs chased Mossadegh out of his home.

The announcement, headed "declaration of danger by active Army officers," said the nation was "now in the hands of foreign agents." This was a reference to the Tudeh (Communist) Party which is giving Mossadegh support in his clash with the shah.
