French Flee Red Forces

SAIGON, Indochina (U.S.A.) — Some 3,000 to 4,000 French and Laotian troops — fleeing over mountain trails in the kingdom of Laos to escape a strong pursuing force of the Communist-led Vietnamese — were reported Friday near the safety of a strongly defended area.

The retreating column was marching single file from the town of Samneua, 108 miles southwest of Hanoi, to Laos' new key defense post of Xiengkhouang, 84 air miles south of Samneua but many more by the tortuous, densely jungled land route.

The latest reports said the French were approaching the plateau of Tran Ninh, where they have built an air strip and strong line of fortifications to cope with any Vietnamese onslaught against Xiengkhouang, just to the south.

The town is a main outpost on a road leading to Luang Prabang, the residence town of Laotian King Sisavang Vong.

The forced march in torrid, tropical heat was another of the bitter French retreats of the long war here against the Vietnamese.

Vietnamese troops pushed by the thousands this week into Laos, which along with Viet Nam and Cambodia makes up the Associated States of Indochina. The French and Laotians have withdrawn into the interior of Laos, avoiding a major clash.

Acre Limitation Bill Considered

WASHINGTON (U.S.A.) — The House Reclamation Subcommittee has scheduled a hearing Monday on a bill that would permit exemptions from the 160-acre limitation provision of the Reclamation Act.

Under the regulation, only tracts 160 acres or less can receive supplemental water from a federal reclamation project.

Committee aides said the session would be only an "initial" hearing on the bill introduced by Rep. Harrison (R-Wyo.) and only a few witnesses will be heard.

USAF Willing To Trade Ground

PORTLAND (U.S.A.) — The Air Force notified Portland Thursday it was willing to trade its 600-acre Vanport site for another suitable site for a rocket storage depot.

To be suitable, though, there would have to be no additional cost to the government nor any great delay, Maj. Gen. Robert E. L. Eaton of the Air Force said in a letter from Washington, D. C.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce has suggested two sites, one near N. E. 158th Avenue near the Columbia River and another near Troutdale. The Chamber has objected that the rocket storage at the Vanport site would be an invitation to enemy bombers, being near the Pacific Highway and the bridge to Vancouver, Wash.

George Black Rite To Be Saturday

PORTLAND (U.S.A.) — Funeral services will be held here Saturday for George Black, 87, Portland accountant who also served as a labor arbitrator.

He was a member of the State Board of Accountancy 16 years. A native of Scotland, he came here in 1890, and obtained a law degree from the University of Oregon in 1898. Later he established an accounting business.

He died here Thursday. The widow, a daughter and two sons survive.

Malan Scores Huge Victory

PRETORIA, South Africa (U.S.A.) — Hundreds of university students waving republican flags and singing Boer marching songs paraded through the streets of this capital city Friday, celebrating Prime Minister Daniel Malan's shattering election victory.

Final returns Friday showed that the stern old ex-preacher's Nationalist forces won 94 of Parliament's 150 seats in Wednesday's voting, giving him a majority of 30 in the lawmaking body.

The opposition United Party copped 57 seats and its allied Labor Party, four. Three already-chosen representatives of 50,000 Cape Coloreds (Mixed-bloods) also usually vote with the opposition.

One seat, now vacant, is expected to go to the opposition when it is filled later. This would reduce Malan's majority to 29—still more than double his 13-man margin in the last Parliament.

Despite the Nationalists' smashing triumph, they trailed about 125,000 votes behind the combined opposition's popular total of nearly 765,000. The arrangement of parliamentary districts favors the country areas where the Nationalists are particularly strong.
