Refuge Chosen for Retriever Trials Site

Dog Meet Scheduled Apr. 24-26

A spokesman for the Shasta Cascade Retriever Club—host in the April 24-26 licensed trials here—announced Thursday the site for the annual spring meet that will bring in some of the top dogs in the country.

A location has been picked in the lower Klamath Wildlife Refuge adjacent to the state line road, Dr. George Adler, trials chairman, said.

Last fall's licensed trials here drew 108 dogs, local and out-of-town, including several national field trial champions.

Retriever club officials this year are anticipating a record number of entries and optimistically predict "the best trial yet"—to be run, as usual, in four divisions: derby stakes, amateur stakes, qualifying stakes, and open all-age, the main event on the canine program.

Fish and wildlife service men were praised by officials of the meet for turning over designated areas of the refuge for the three-day land and water meet.

James Horn and Gene Branson, fish and wildlife enforcement agents, said the trials site is being put in tip-top shape with all necessary facilities for a successful run. The site is a natural with plenty of natural coverage, stubble fields and water, Adler said.

The Tulelake-Butte Valley Sportsmen Association has helped the fish and wildlife group in getting ready for the trials.

ND Baseball In High Gear

Tom Sharkey Dies At 79 in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Tom Sharkey, 79, barrel-chested battler who was the last of the prize ring greats of the 1890s, died Friday.

The game little slugger, who had won \$250,000 fighting John L. Sullivan, Jim Corbett, Bob Fitzsimmons and Jim Jeffries and others, died broke—but not forgotten.

He had been in San Francisco City and County Hospital since August, 1952. His friends—fighters, promoters, old-time newsmen and followers—chipped in to pay his expenses.

Doctors at San Francisco hospital said Sharkey "died easily in his sleep" at 3:15 a.m.

He was admitted Jan. 31 for the tenth time for treatment of a heart ailment.

His death rang down the curtain on a long-gone era of pugilism. It followed closely Jeffries'—Sharkey's greatest rival—who died in Los Angeles March 3.

Sharkey never won a title, but he slugged it out with the best in 11 years in the ring, starting in 1893. He used to boast that he was "afraid of no man—none ever made me take a backward step."

DETROIT (AP)—A 28-year-old former softball pitcher displayed the best hurling in the Motor City Thursday and Doris Knechtges doesn't perform for the Detroit Tigers or Cleveland Indians.

Miss Knechtges is a bowler, who spins her power-ball for the B&B Chevrolet quintet and Friday she stood on top, alone or as co-holder, of all four first places in the Women's International Bowling Congress tournament.

Doris, a slight, blonde office-worker, crashed to the top with 1,886 in all events, 631 in singles and combined with her "boss" at Precision Springs Corp., Jane Grudzien, for 1,211 in doubles.

The B&B team, anchored by Miss Knechtges, had gone into the regular team lead Thursday night on a strong 2,931 tally.
