counsel to the New York Herald Tribune, reported only one serious setback in recent state laws—a North Carolina statute permitting a legislative subcommittee to meet secretly.

Cross listed among other significant trends and developments:

1. Nine states have passed statutes opening relief rolls to public inspection—Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Virginia and "to a degree," New York.
2. Laws requiring state boards to hold open meetings have been passed in two states—Louisiana and Washington—and are pending in others.
3. There have been "an unusual number of instances" of secrecy in court proceedings, including the barring of newsmen from the New York trial of Minot Jelke for compulsory prostitution. He said an appeal in this case might determine whether the Constitution requires the states to make trials public.

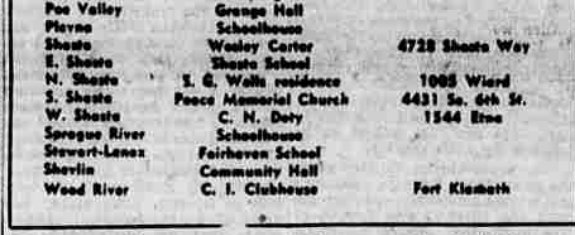

Take It Easy On Your Old Dentist, Bub, He May Be In Worse Shape Than You

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Your dentist is more to be pitied than censured — he's all broken up because everybody hates him and he's unconsciously seeking a release for his tension.

That's what San Francisco psychiatrists told the California State Dental Association Wednesday.

Knowing that you dislike him before he even gets his forceps on you, the dentist works up so much tension that he may, without realizing it, actually become sadistic, said Dr. Douglas G. Campbell.

Dr. Loren R. Borland, a dentist trained as a psychiatrist, said part of the trouble is due to the unnatural relationship between dentist and patient. The mouth, he said, is made for eating, talking and making love, not as an exploration ground for a man's fingers.

The patient, naturally, resents being forced to half-swallow a human hand. Nor is the dentist happy about placing his fingers in a position where they might be bitten off.

It finally reaches the point where somebody is likely to get hurt.

This is when the dentist should take a break and say, "now spit."

It might be a good idea to add, "and swear a little, too," said Borland.

"And it wouldn't hurt for the dentist to do a little swearing himself."

The dentist might even declare "this hurts me worse than it does you," and it probably would be the truth, the psychiatrists agreed.

"It bothers anybody to feel that he's unpopular," said Dr. Alexander Simon, "and the dentist is disliked all day long, by one patient after another."

But don't resort to the bottle or sleeping pills to relieve your tension, Campbell advised the dentists.
