Howe Speaks At Rotary

The problems of education on a national basis were discussed by Carol Howe, superintendent of the county school system, at the Rotary Club meeting Friday noon at the Willard Hotel.

Howe, who is president of the school superintendents of the state, attended the national meeting of his group at Atlantic City in February and based his talk on problems of education that were brought up at the meeting.

He told of the problems of curriculum, of patterning school courses to meet the needs of present day living; the problems of teacher supply, which is acute from economic conditions; and of attacks on public education.

Communist groups are seeking to undermine our courts, our churches and our public schools, Howe said. He stated that educators are lending every effort to combat subversive influences.

He made the plea to "investigate before you conclude." He emphasized that it is a discouraging picture nationally, in looking at all Atlantic City problems, but that Klamath schools are in a good healthy condition.

Ben McCollum was introduced as a new member of the Klamath Falls Rotary Club, with the classification of "agriculture-fertilizers."

Arnold Gralapp was chairman of the day. Director Bud Chandler, presided in the absence of President Scott Warren.

Dr. West Tule Speaker

TULELAKE — Dr. J. Kirkland West, pastor of the Medford Presbyterian church, was speaker at the Wednesday luncheon meeting of the Tulelake Rotary.

His address "Communism vs. Christianity" drew the conclusion that the world has no hope for existence unless Christianity can replace the sweep of Communism across the earth within the next 25 years.

Dr. West spoke from first-hand observation of the Red scourge. He was serving as a missionary in China when Red armies swept across the north, was captured and held prisoner for many months. While he suffered no personal injuries, he saw torture among many other prisoners. With others he was scheduled to die the day following his unexpected release.

The next meeting of the Rotary Club, Wednesday, April 22, will be a luncheon at the Sportsman's Hotel in commemoration of the 14th anniversary of the organization, which will honor all charter members.

Members of the clubs, Alturas and Klamath Falls, that sponsored the Tulelake club will be guests.

There will be a review of past activities and past presidents, many of whom will be present for the meeting.

"Change Of Life" In Men May Lead To Suicide Try

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP) — Many men in their fifties undergo an emotional "change of life" that often can lead to suicide if untreated, a Navy psychiatrist said today.

The condition, said Capt. George N. Raines, is somewhat similar to the emotional tension and anxiety that affect some women during the female menopause which is actually a physical "change of life."

After the menopause, a woman loses ability to bear children, but maintains sexual potency.

In the female "change of life," Raines said, there are distinct physical alterations in the balance between certain glandular and nervous systems to help account for emotional effects. But he said there is no evidence that a similar physiological change takes place in men—at least to a degree that would tie in, in any major way, with the anxiety upsets noted in some fifty-year-old men.

Raines is chief of the Navy's neuropsychiatry branch and director of the department of psychiatry at Georgetown University School of Medicine.

"The term 'male menopause' has been ascribed to these emotional disorders which are somewhat common in men after a certain age," Raines told the annual meeting of the American College of Physicians, "but there is fair recognition that the term is something of a misnomer."

He said the symptoms occur largely in men "who have set goals so high they are impossible of attainment."

"They are actually successful men who feel that failure threatens them," he added. "Most of them are married to their work as well as their wives, and they are bothered by fancied threats, the nature of which they can't always put their finger on."
