The Senate also approved the President's order retiring Gen. James A. Van Fleet, former commander of the Eighth Army in Korea, with the rank of full general. Van Fleet's permanent Army rank had been major general.

Four Hurt In Accidents

Four persons were hospitalized at Klamath Valley Hospital yesterday by highway accidents.

Ervin McNabb, 5123 Altamont, suffered a fractured knee when his station wagon hit a parked car and the corner of Harlow's second hand store. The parked car, property of Marion Kendall, 1751 Dayton, was parked in front of the Oregon Food Store, 2410 S. 6th. McNabb's station wagon hit the left rear fender of the car, went out of control and crashed into the corner of the second hand store. Both vehicles and the second hand store were severely damaged, according to City Police.

McNabb was still in the hospital today and a reckless driving complaint had been issued against him.

Lee and Hugh Davis, Bonanza brothers, were bruised and cut early Sunday morning when a car went out of control on the East Langell Valley road. Lee Davis has been discharged from the hospital but Hugh was still a patient at noon today.

In a motorcycle accident yesterday, Francis Gertman, Tulelake, suffered a fractured leg. He was still hospitalized today.

At Portland Friday the potato supply was liberal for the old crop potatoes. The supply of new crop potatoes was light. Brokers sales of old crop potatoes were unchanged and there were no sales of new crop potatoes.

At San Francisco there were two few brokers track sales of potatoes to quote prices or establish a market.

At Los Angeles the new crop long white potatoes were weaker. Old crop Russets were steady. Trucklot and carlot sales of Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, ranged from 4.50 to 4.90 a 100 pound sack. A few sales of larger sizes were higher. Deschutes bakers, U.S. No. 2, brought 3.25 a 100 pound sack.

At Chicago the old stock potatoes were moderate in supply. The demand was moderate. The market was firm. Sales of Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, 10 to 15 per cent 10 ounces and larger, unwashed, brought 5.10 a hundredweight. Street sales and generally good quality Idaho Russets, ranged from 5.50 to 5.75 a 100 pound sack.

Total shipments of potatoes throughout the nation Thursday amounted to 804 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped 144 cars. Idaho moved 123 cars. Oregon 15 cars and Washington 5 cars.

Track holdings of potatoes at the 16 major cities of the nation amounted to 700 cars of old potatoes and 139 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 758 cars of old potatoes and 209 cars of new potatoes on track one week ago.

Arrivals today were reported at 267 cars of old potatoes and 60 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 263 cars of old potatoes and 63 cars of new potatoes arriving one week earlier.

State at between four and five million dollars. Damage in Arkansas was fixed at about 1 1/2 million. Georgia damage, confined principally to the columbus area, was estimated at several millions.

The storms, packing gusts of up to more than 100 miles an hour, first struck in Northeast Arkansas Saturday night, dipped into Central and East Alabama, then slammed into West Georgia.

Lee County and Siluria, Ala., and Columbus were the areas hardest hit, although many small communities suffered heavy damage.

The baby tornadoes pounced into 15 Alabama towns and rural areas all told, and the injury reported totaled 127 in that state.

Runoff Of Columbia Down

BOISE (U) — The Columbia River Basin faces the prospect of a below normal runoff this spring for the first time in eight years, a Western snow conference was told Monday.

Morgan W. Nelson, head of the Soil Conservation Snow Survey in Boise, and other speakers said all signs point to a smaller runoff this year.

Stream flow from October through March was below normal. This would be a bad sign if the snow pack were large, Nelson said, indicating possible floods later in the spring. However, with less snow than usual on the watershed, the lower flow will tend to even out the river's flow over the season, he said.

Additional storage now available in the new Hungry Horse, Pend Oreille, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Flathead Dams, he said, also will make more water available in the summer.

A peak flow of 500,000 cubic feet was forecast for The Dalles Dam, about half the peak when the Columbia flooded in 1948.

Some Smelt In Sandy River

PORTLAND (U) — State police reported some smelt heading up the Sandy River Monday, but there was no rush of dip-netters to the banks of the stream 12 miles east of Portland.

It is illegal to dip for the small fish until Tuesday.

Patrolman Darwin Petrie and two Troutdale residents reported the run was sizeable. Some observers had doubt the run would remain large, though, pointing out that there never previously has been a run in the river later than April 9.

Henley School Clinic Set

Mothers of pre-school age children in the Henley district who will enter the first grade at the beginning of the school term next fall have been invited to visit the Henley school with their boys and girls Thursday, April 23. The visiting period starts at 12:30 p.m. Children who will be six years old by next Nov. 15 will be eligible to enter school.

The visit is planned to orient beginners with teachers, rooms, the playgrounds and the cafeteria where children visitors will be served luncheon while mothers are served in the gymnasium.

Mothers will see a special program, including a talk by the Klamath County school nurse, May Spiers and numbers by Henley school students. There will also be a discussion period on the Beginner's Handbook and mothers will be invited to ask questions.

Children may be registered during the visit.

More than 40 invitations have been sent out by Lois Rummel, elementary school principal, but mothers of any child not receiving a notice are cordially invited to attend.

Airline Tells Of Purchase

SEATTLE (U) — Northwest Airlines announced Monday the purchase of six Lockheed Super-Constellations for its transcontinental and Orient routes.

The announcement said the 250-mile-an-hour planes will cut two hours off the New York-Seattle flight time and four hours off the Seattle-Tokyo time.

Gen. Harold R. Harris, president, said the purchase was prompted by increased business and the hope of extending service into Southeast Asia. The four-engine planes, with compartments and movable seats, can carry as many as 90 passengers.

Delivery is scheduled for 1954 and early 1955. Northwest negotiated a \$21,800,000 loan through 14 banks to make the deal.

Warm Weather Ups Streams

Oregon's balmy weather is expected to bring slight rises in streams fed by snow fields. Elmer Fisher, river forecaster for the Portland Weather Bureau, said Monday.

Fisher said, however, that the rises would be slow, since little snow is left at lower elevations and much of the runoff will soak into the ground before it reaches streams.

Sunny skies brought the temperature into the 70s in scattered sections of Oregon Sunday. Highest reading reported to the Weather Bureau was 77 degrees at The Dalles. Ontario reported 76, Pendleton 73 and Portland and Eugene 70.

The only frost Monday morning was at Baker where the temperature was 31.

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
