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San Diego Shuts Out Portland

The Pacific Coast League has been a happy hunting ground for the hitters in the first three weeks of play. The weather has been pretty much on the cool side and pitchers haven't had the opportunity to get some of the kinks out of their salary wings.

Things are bound to change and within another three weeks the ranks of the so-called select batters undoubtedly will be decimated. The Pacific Coast League is regarded as a hitting league, but not by any such margin as exists today.

Sacramento, picked to finish in the cellar, is in sixth place, but Gene DeBartolo's club is leading the circuit in team batting with a mark of .381. The Sacs' weakness is that they have manufactured only 81 runs from 183 hits, whereas Seattle has gotten 129 runs from 198 hits although having a team batting mark of .278.

There were three make-up games played Monday night, San Diego knocking out Portland, 4-0, and San Francisco's Seals splitting with Oakland, the Seals taking the first 8-3 and the Oaks the second 19-9.

San Diego got all its runs in the fourth inning off Royce Lint. Red Malbis' single that scored Earl Rapp and Lou Strimer stowed away the game for the Padres. Lint held San Diego helpless the rest of the way, but Bill Thomason was in complete charge for the Padres, allowing the Beavers only three hits. The game made up one postponed by rain last Thursday.

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La Starza, Bucceroni Rate High

Heavies 3, 4 On NBA List

WASHINGTON — Roland La Starza and Dan Bucceroni jumped into the heavyweight title picture today on the strength of the National Boxing Association's spring ratings.

La Starza, a slick boxer who lost a much-disputed split decision to Champion Rocky Marciano three years ago, hopped into the No. 3 challenger spot on the basis of his victory over Rex Layne during the winter.

Bucceroni, a slugger from Philadelphia, climbed from nowhere into the No. 4 challenger position, and he claims he's ready to take on all comers.

Former Champions Jersey Joe Walcott and Ezzard Charles are rated one-two behind Marciano. Walcott gets a shot at the title May 15.

Col. Harvey Miller, NBA secretary, said "the natural assumption" is that Charles will take on La Starza, with the winner getting the next crack at the title.

There were no major surprises in the NBA's spring ratings, announced yesterday. Four men were lumped in the top middleweight bracket, where a champion still is to be crowned to replace the retired Sugar Ray Robinson.

Randy Turpin of England, who took the title from Robinson once only to lose it again, is listed at the top, followed in order by Bobo Olson of Hawaii, Charles Humes of France and Paddy Young of New York.
