

Ore. Waterfowl Inventory Shows 59 Per Cent Rise

Oregon's 1953 winter inventory of waterfowl showed an increase of 59 per cent over 1952, according to statistics related by Chet Kebbe at the recent Pacific Flyway Committee meeting. The committee, designed to standardize various waterfowl management procedures, met recently at Elko, Nev. Kebbe, chief biologist in waterfowl for the State Game Commission, attended as Oregon's representative.

The committee is composed of biologists from the various states and provinces in the Pacific Flyway and meets annually to present progress reports in various fields. Kebbe's reports show a total count of 442,729 migratory waterfowl wintering in Oregon.

Another report of interest to Oregon sportsmen was given by Urban Nelson of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Nelson banded 150 Western Canada geese at their breeding grounds in South-eastern Alaska in the summer of 1952. Over 30 of these birds were killed in the Willamette Valley during the hunting season of 1952. The 20 per cent kill is due largely to the fact that the birds spend the winter in this heavily populated area. The committee is working on ways of protecting northern breeding grounds to offset the heavy hunting pressure on this fine game bird.

Other data obtained from banding shows that a large number of cackling geese banded in the Yukon Delta of Alaska are killed in Oregon. Of the banded birds reported, 36 were killed in Klamath and Lake Counties, seven in areas of central Oregon and four west of the Cascades.

Banding activities are carried out by all of the states and Oregon has banded approximately 1500 waterfowl since January. Banding operations were hindered somewhat this year as the open winter made birds more difficult to bait into traps.

Standardization of procedures in banding, breeding ground surveys, kill checks, and winter inventories were discussed. Findings are submitted to the Pacific Flyway Council which is the policy making group for the states covered by the biologists of the Pacific Flyway Committee.

Lionel Barrymore Turns To Writing As New Career

HOLLYWOOD—Lionel Barrymore, who will be 75 next Tuesday, thinks it's not too late to start a new career. His first novel will soon be on the bookshelves.

Crusty old Lionel is the most versatile of the Barrymores. His compositions have been played by symphony orchestras, and his etchings and paintings have won acclaim. He is the only Barrymore who has won an Oscar for a starring role—in "A Free Soul" in 1931.

Like many actors, Barrymore has long admired authors. Among his earliest memories was his meeting with Mark Twain, seven-year-old Lionel came up from Philadelphia to see his father, Maurice Barrymore, who was appearing in a New York play.

Although he is pursuing the three-quarter-century mark, the actor shows no signs of slowing down. He continues his radio show and does occasional movies, his latest being "Main Street to Broadway." He wouldn't mind teaching TV, but his studio won't let him.

Dogs Disturb Pheasant Nest

A perennial problem is again threatening the fall crop of Chinese pheasants in the state of Oregon. Though the destruction of nests of game birds is illegal, many people persist in letting pet dogs rove freely about the fields. The dogs disturb nesting hen pheasants and destroy their nests and in so doing the success of the hunting season the following fall is jeopardized.

Game Commission records show that approximately 60 per cent of cock pheasants harvested by sportsmen during the hunting season are birds hatched the preceding spring. This percentage illustrated the importance of a good spring hatching of birds in relation to fall hunting success.

The Game Commission asks that all dog owners keep their pets under control and give the birds a "break" during nesting season.
