Pace of the 25th annual conference of the Oregon State Division of the American Association of University Women that opened here yesterday was accelerated today with the formal opening of the conference this morning at Mills School auditorium.

Ninety out-of-town delegates were registered this morning with 27 branches, Albany, Ashland, Astoria, Baker, Bend, Coos, Bay-North Bend, Corvallis, Eugene, Forest Grove-Hillsboro, Grants Pass, Hood River, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Lakeview, McMinnville, Medford, Ontario, Oregon City, Pendleton, Portland, Salem, Seaside, St. Helens, The Dalles, Tillamook and Willows County represented.

Klamath Falls members brought attendance at last night's buffet supper at Reames Golf and Country Club, to 150 guests.

Mrs. Paul Patterson, wife of Oregon's Governor, was guest speaker for the evening.
