CHICAGO (AP)—Live hogs lost a little more price ground Monday in a weak to 25 cents lower market. Cattle were fully steady to \$1.00 higher and sheep steady to strong.

Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$2.75 to \$2.85 and a top of \$2.85. Sows took mostly \$1.90 to \$2.15 and a top of \$2.25. Clearance was good on the 9,000 hogs received over the week end.

Good to prime steers sold from \$18.50 to \$24.50 with two loads topping at \$25.00. Choice and prime heifers were \$21.00 to \$23.50. Sows topped at \$13.00, bulls at \$13.50, and calves at \$26.00.

Choice and prime fed weaned lambs sold in a narrow range of \$25.25 to \$25.50 and comparable shortens from \$23.25 to \$24.00. Ewes ranged downward from \$9.00.

Other estimated arrivals included 16,000 cattle, 300 calves, and 2,500 sheep.

At Portland Friday the potato supply was moderate. The demand was moderate and the market about steady.

At San Francisco the old crop of potatoes was about steady. Klamath Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, brought \$4 a 100 pound sack in a few sales today. Klamath bakers, U.S. No. 1 A, were quoted at 5.25 a hundred weight. There were no sales of new crop potatoes reported.

At Los Angeles the potato market was slightly weaker. Truckload and carlot sales of old crop Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, small size, brought 4 a 100 pound sack. There were very few sales reported.

At Chicago the supply of old crop potatoes was moderate. The demand was slow and the market was dull to slightly weaker. Track sales of Idaho Russets were limited. There were no early sales reported. Street sales of Idaho Russets ranged from 5.75 to 6 a 100 pound sack. The supply of new crop potatoes was light. The demand was steady. There were no early sales reported.

Total shipments of potatoes throughout the national Thursday amounted to 1031 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped 135 cars. Idaho moved 112 cars and Oregon moved 18 cars.

Track loadings at the 15 major cities of the nation Friday amounted to 684 cars of old potatoes and 51 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 702 cars of old potatoes and 139 cars of new potatoes on track one week ago. Arrivals today amounted to 289 cars of old potatoes and 51 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 257 cars of old potatoes and 60 cars of new potatoes arriving one week earlier.

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AAUW Winds Up Three-Day Conference In Klamath Falls

During late procedure and final session of the Oregon State Division of the American Association of University Women, its members voted to honor its retiring president, Mrs. C. A. Fariss, Portland, by naming one of its study grants to the national organization, the Gertrude Hunk Fariss Grant. Any state division or member branch contributing \$500 or more to the study grant program may name a grant. It is probable that this year, the Oregon division will be able to name three grants in addition to the one named by individual branches. One will be named for Mrs. Fariss who has just been named head of St. Helen's Hall, Portland.

The assembly voted also, following rapid fire discussion to retain the Oregon Division's own \$1000 fellowship for Oregon women scholars, held this year by Mrs. Myrtle Holby Dawson, teacher of speech in Portland public schools who is working for her doctorate at the University of Washington. The fellowship is awarded annually to an outstanding Oregon woman for graduate work.

Opposition to continuing the fellowship was based on the planned expansion of a regional basis of the national association's fellowship to meet the rising costs of administration at the state level. Mrs. Lela Hunk, first president of the division, came out among several other delegates as strongly in favor of continuing the award.

Delegates voted by a wide margin to keep their fellowship and in many means of increasing finances, voted to raise dues to assure the state board of increased revenue for the coming year.

Under a by-law revision, approved with few dissenting voices, the legislative committee will have authority to study measures introduced into the state legislature to support or oppose them in the name of the state division if they are in direct policy of the organization. Delegates also voted to continue support of school district reorganization, television on an educational level and urged signing of the Anderson report bills by Governor Paul Patterson.

One of the highlights of this year's conference was the exhibit of the arts at the Art Center which brought out 125 entries by AAUW members, representing several of the state branches.

Nell Helms, Grants Pass; water colors, Lynette Ross, Seaside; metal work, Mrs. Thomas Delzell, Portland; pottery, Ruth Hunsen, Albany; ceramics, Cecelia Deane, Albany; miscellaneities, two awards, Helen Caywood, Albany and photograph, Dorothy Thornton, Salem.

Film Unknown Nabs Top Role in "Caine Mutiny"
HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The Caine story of the year stars hunky 20-year-old Robert Francis, formerly of Pasadena City College and the U. S. Army.

Francis, whose father delivers mail in Pasadena, has been named to play Willie Keith, the piano-playing green ensign and hero of "The Caine Mutiny." He will be surrounded by a cast that will include Jose Ferrer and possibly Humphrey Bogart and Richard Widmark.

How does he feel? "Like a lump rag," he sighed. "It has all happened so fast that it's a little hard to believe."

Francis has never appeared in a picture or a play. Furthermore, he never thought about being an actor until a talent scout approached him about three years ago. He told me the amazing story shortly after his prize role had been announced.

"I went swimming at a beach club in Santa Monica," he recalled. "A talent scout from Universal happened to see me, and he traced me down by the license on my car. I was invited to the studio for an interview."

The lad still had no ambitions about being an actor, but he read some scripts for the late Sophie Rosenblatt. She said he had possibilities, but needed seasoning. She sent him to the drama classes of Botomi Schneider.

Mrs. Schneider has coached such players as David Brian, Tom Curran, Janet Leigh, John Agar, Diana Lynn, Leta Stetter and Piper Laurie. Francis joined the night classes, reading scenes from plays and improvising dialogue along with the other students. The coach was impressed with his progress and referred him to her husband, Benno Schneider, talent man at Columbia.

"I studied with Benno for a couple of months," Francis recalled. "I was about to sign a deal when I got that familiar envelope from Uncle Sam."

"The Army was the greatest thing that could happen to me. I was stationed at Camp Roberts as a public speaking instructor for commissioned officers. I also had a chance to do some radio work and talked to Rotary Clubs and so forth. I benefited from the experience, as well as two years of maturing."

Cpl. Francis got out of the service Feb. 9 and dropped in at Columbia.

Now he has a term contract with Columbia and the hero's part in "Mutiny," which ranks second only to the Bible as the best seller in the last two years.

Born in Glendale, Calif., Francis is a strapping 6 feet 3 and 194 pounds. He is ruggedly good looking, with the crew cut you would expect of Willie Keith. His favorite pastime is sailing. He might not be in his present lucky position if it hadn't been for a freakish turn of California weather.

Bob and his brother ran three ski shops catering to devotees of the sport in the San Bernardino Mountains. Their business was thriving until the winters of 1946 through 1948. No snow. The boys sold out. The older brother landed a job with a beer company, and Bob started on his way toward service on the old USS Caine.
