Immigration Law Probe Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower, citing 10 objections to the McCarran-Walter Law enacted last year, has called for a new congressional study of immigration operations.

The President's views were set out in a letter April 6 to Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), chairman of a Senate Judiciary subcommittee on immigration. Watkins made it public Monday.

Declaring that he has received "a great many complaints" that the McCarran-Walter Act embodied "many serious and inequitable restrictions," Eisenhower suggested an immediate study of the law "with an invitation to all concerned to testify regarding the provisions of which they complain."

Sen. McCarran (D-Nev.) and Rep. Walter (D-Pa.) sponsored the measure enacted during the last Democratic Congress. It attempted to codify immigration statutes and tighten up safeguards against admission of subversive aliens.

Adenauer Backs Down On Plans

BONN, Germany (AP) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer abandoned Monday night his bold plan to get the European Army treaty signed without the approval of both houses of Parliament.

This abrupt reversal followed his earlier cancellation of plans to avert a political battle over the treaty by winning over the Socialist opposition.

Adenauer had announced that he intended to hand the EDC treaty and its companion pact—the West German peace contract—to President Theodor Heuss Tuesday for signature even though they lacked final parliamentary approval.

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High Tariff Spokesman Sees Losses

WASHINGTON (AP) — A spokesman for high tariffs told Congress Monday an increase in foreign goods sold here would bring "depression and disaster" to the American economy.

O. R. Strackbein, chairman of a committee of industry, labor and agriculture groups, spoke out at a time when many administration leaders and U. S. allies have been urging a lowering of tariffs to encourage more imports.

Strackbein said the Roosevelt and Truman administrations already have sowed the seeds of calamity by using a "meat axe approach" in "hasty and reckless" lowering of thousands of import duties over the past 14 years.

He asserted 25 per cent of the American labor force is employed

in industry or branches of agriculture that are vulnerable to import competition.

Strackbein was the leadoff witness as the House Ways and Means Committee opened hearings on a bill by Rep. Simpson (R-Pa.) to extend the Reciprocal Trade Act for one year.

The act, now due to expire June 12, is the broad authority for negotiating new tariffs.

At the outset, Simpson disclosed he is willing to drop one of the most important and controversial provisions of his bill. This section would strip President Eisenhower of his present power to negotiate new tariffs, or continue old ones, at levels found by the Tariff Commission to imperil American industry.

Meanwhile Eisenhower discussed with GOP congressional leaders plans to set up a commission to study U. S. foreign economic policy, and specifically the Reciprocal Trade Act.

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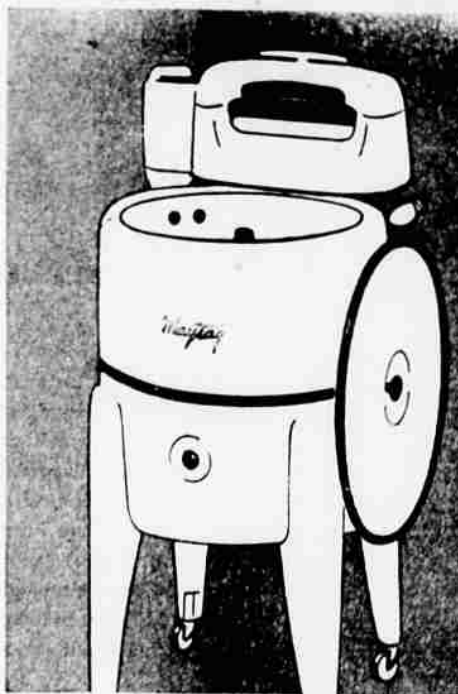
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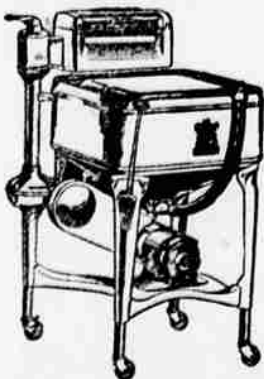
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
