Ammo Lack Probe Still Being Pushed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Omar Bradley, now in Europe, may be asked to supply final data for a new investigation of ammunition shortages in Korea.

Gen. Byrd (D-Va.) said he had told Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, to supply as much data as possible on the Korean war effort before June 30.

He had received the documents, and said in an interview, he understood Bradley now was making military installations in Europe and plans to return May 1.

Byrd, who has been active in the investigation by a five-member Senate Armed Services Subcommittee, is particularly interested in evidence that top level military and civilian officials believed during the first few months of Korean War that it would be brief. The fighting began in June, 1950.

Former Secretary of the Army Frank Pace and other officials said such a belief was widely held and was one of several reasons for not greatly expanding ammunition production.

Pace said Gen. Douglas MacArthur, then supreme commander in the Far East, believed the Korean War would end by December, 1950, and that military leaders in the Pentagon concurred.

Gen. George C. Marshall had said that as secretary of defense he signed a series of budget papers in September, 1950, based on the assumption the Korean War would be over by June 30, 1951.

Marshall, who had taken office as defense secretary only a few days before, said these papers were signed by Bradley, Byrd then

OSC Paper Held To Be Indecent

CONVALLIS (AP) — Publication of the annual April Fool Day student magazine, the Thermometer, has been banned by Oregon State College President A. L. Hurand.

The annual satire of the regular student Daily Herald was increased this year, Hurand said. The paper is published by Sigma Delta, a campus fraternity.

It is a sharply worded statement, Hurand said. "Responsibility of student editors should not be swayed by a few smart blocks who have no regard for the college and its reputation for quality education."

US Tank Production Falls Below Level Of Russia's

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will have on hand by the start of this summer about 13,000 medium tanks, still far short of the estimated 40,000 of all types generally credited to Russia.

But, an Army spokesman said today, there is no intention of desire to match Soviet armor, tank for tank, any more than there is attempt to match the huge Russian-satellite force man-for-man.

Several factors are involved in this planning. If a war should start tomorrow, the spokesman said, "current tool-up production lines could be accelerated to keep us supplied in quantity with superior tanks."

Moreover, Army tacticians do not subscribe to the theory the only way to beat an enemy tank is with another tank. The spokesman said that "under certain circumstances, it is true that the best — and, incidentally, the most expensive — way to fight a tank is with another tank."

But the Army also relies on other antitank weapons, including the recoilless rifle with its "shaped" charge for penetrating tank armor by a burning action, and the familiar bazooka and rifle grenade launcher for close-in fighting.

Another apparent factor, unmentioned by the Army spokesman, is that the 13,000-tank figure shown in Defense Department information consists only of medium gun tanks. It does not include either the new light tanks, which have been in volume production for well over a year, or heavy tanks just going into production. The 40,000 estimate for the USSR is presumed to include all categories of tanks, including obsolete ones.

Electrical Energy Output Declines

NEW YORK (AP) — Electrical energy distributed by utilities in the United States declined last week to 8,615,707,000 kilowatt hours from 8,112,969,000 the week before, the Edison Electric Institute reported Wednesday.

Last week's total was a gain of 123 per cent over the 7,134,844,000 kilowatt hours turned out in the same week a year ago.

All geographical divisions showed gains over the same week of 1952. The Pacific Northwest was up 11.4 per cent.
