## Beauty Queen Doesn't Do So Well In Landing Film Job

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Want to break into the movies? Then don't enter beauty contests.  
 Luscious blonde Evelyn Love, quiet, an acting hopeful herself, gives that advice to other young dolls who seek to step into Dorothy Lamour's sarong or Lana Turner's sweater.  
 Evelyn ought to know. She is the winner of unpeppery beauty contests and has been named everything from Miss USA to Miss Doughnut Week. These honors have gotten her nowhere in her chosen profession as a dramatic actress.  
 "If I had it to do over again, I don't think I would have entered all those contests," she said. "When producers learn that you have been a contest winner, they automatically think that's all you can do. You can't convince them that you have other talents."  
 Her complaint seems to be borne out by the facts. No Miss America, Rose Queen or any other top beauty winner appears to have won solid fame in show business.  
 Evelyn added that beauty contest prizes do not always turn out the way they are billed. She said that when several years ago she won a local contest as Miss USA, she was promised big prizes, including a brand-new station wagon. Her net return: one large living cup.  
 She also competed for weeks and was selected Miss TV. The big prize was a movie contract at an independent film studio. When she reported for work, they showed her the small print. Her contract consisted of one day's work as an extra.  
 A few years ago, lovely Evelyn was a bookkeeper at her father's aircraft plant and had no thought of playing the beauty circuit. When her father secretly entered her in a contest held by his Scandinavian organization, she was named queen of the Midsummer Festival and won a scholarship to a modeling school. That started her off.  
 She was selected out of 300 girls to be the Girl from Jones Beach, to advertise the picture of the same name. The prizes for that

"To be an actress who can do the light roles that Carole Lombard used to do," she replied. "I'm not ready for pictures yet."

"I'm going to get experience. When I try the movies, I want to know me as an actress, not a beauty contest winner."

men began to appear and station themselves at strategic points. Their presence lent an added tinge of excitement to the affair for the out-of-towners. Washington residents, of course, are biased to such details.  
 There was a hitch. At 12:27, President Dwight D. Eisenhower announced that there would be a slight delay. It was presumed that the delay was due to failure of his plane to arrive on time, but it turned out that the President had suffered during the morning from a slight stomach upset, and had to recover from it before speaking.

You wouldn't have known it, however, from his manner. As he entered the great room from a side door leading directly to the speaker's table, everyone arose. Not at a signal. The movement was spontaneous. Somehow you just found yourself on your feet.  
 He waved and grinned, and it there had been tension and excitement before, there was none after his gesture and his grin. Everyone was instantly at ease. Ike is like that. It is a quality that is inherent in him.  
 There was an interval while we waited for the radio and television networks to clear after the delay. Ike chatted with those next to him—as casually as if he had merely dropped in at lunch time for a brief chat with friends.  
 When he spoke, it was to all appearances a friendly man speaking to a gathering of friends. In reality, he was speaking over the heads of the members of the American Society of Newspaper Editors to the men in the Kremlin. It was a critical moment in history. Would these men—NEW men, not yet warm in their seats of power, men who if they chose, COULD change the whole course of world communism—listen? Would they be impressed? Would they, MIGHT they change from war to peace?  
 It must have been a moment of extreme gravity for Ike. But he gave no sign of nervousness or tension. He said what he had to say. He spoke earnestly, and at times with strong feeling, and his voice and his words carried the conviction of utter sincerity.  
 Again you had that feeling of easing of tension. Here was a man who knew what had to be done and who would DO it. Everything would turn out all right. Ike has that effect on people.  
 Before you knew it, it was all over. The audience rose, of course, cheering—not wildly and noisily, but with deep feeling and respect and confidence. The President marched out of the room, acknowledging with his warm grin and his characteristic hand wave the ovation he was getting.  
 As soon as was seemly, the luncheon guests rushed to the balcony that overlooks the main entrance of the hotel. In a little while Ike, flanked by secret service men, walked through the doors to his waiting automobile. The President's flag on the car had already jammed the street with a waiting crowd. Ike walked through—not as a big man apart, but as one of the people of the United States. Just going back to his job.  
 He is that sort of person. You FEEL it as you watch him and listen to him.
