WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — A slow but persistent decline Thursday took the stock market moderately lower.
The entire list was affected by the slide which went to between 1 and 2 points at the worst. Most of the losses were small. Gains were scattered in various parts of the list but were ineffective in holding the line.
Volume was at the slowest pace of the year — an estimated 1,000,000 shares. That compares with 1-1/2, 3,000,000 shares traded Wednesday.

CHICAGO (AP) — Old crop soybean contracts dropped more than 5 cents at times on the board of trade Thursday to pace a general downward move in all cereals.
Losses elsewhere weren't nearly as large as in soybeans, but wheat nevertheless brought its lowest price since 1950 and all rice contracts dropped into new seasonal low ground. Rice enjoyed a brief rally which more than recouped its early losses.
Corn eased in sympathy with the general market, but oats held steady. The May oats contract developed late strength on short covering.

Southern Oregon Music Festival To Be Held At KUHS On Friday, Saturday

Over 1000 boys and girls will participate Friday and Saturday, May 1 and 2 in the annual Southern Oregon District Competition Music Festival to be held at KUHS. The meet is sponsored by the Southern Oregon Music Educators Association.
Announcement of the event that will bring the cream of vocal and instrumental school musicians together from 17 schools, was made today by Andrew Loney Jr., music director in the city schools.
Students of both senior and junior high schools will participate, starting Friday morning at 8:30 a.m. with Gary Robertson, general supervisor of schools as chairman. The Friday morning session will be given over to choruses from Ashland, Crater, Medford, Phoenix, Prospect, Illinois Valley, Etna, Lakeview and Klamath Falls, and one band presentation by Jacksonville.
Band numbers and one mixed chorus are on the agenda for Friday afternoon. Wendell Smith, vice principal of KUHS will be in charge. Schools taking part will be Talent, Lakeview, Myrtle Creek, Ashland, Crater, Etna, Illinois Valley, Phoenix, Henley and Central Point.
Top session of the meet will be the band and orchestra competition Friday night between A Class competitors, Medford and Klamath Falls, starting at 8 p.m. This program will be of particular interest and is open to the public. A small charge will be made. Charles Carlson, principal of KUHS will supervise the program.
Saturday will be devoted to junior division events with grades 4-7 Roosevelt and Mills school bands playing at 9 and 9:30 a.m. Junior high school bands and orchestras of Ashland, Talent, Medford competing. Lowell Kaupp, principal of Klamath Falls Junior High as chairman.
Junior High School bands of Lakeview, Medford, Myrtle Creek, the Josephine County band, the Dilworth band from Klamath Falls, the Klamath Falls High School band, the Klamath Falls Junior High School band, and the Klamath Falls High School band are scheduled for the final round Saturday afternoon. Andrew Loney Jr., will be in charge.
Judges will be Wayne Herin, chairman, Division of Music, Central Washington College of Education, Ellensburg, Wash.; Wallace H. Hamann, Supervisor of Music, Vancouver, Wash.; and Chester R. Duncan, former Supervisor of Music, Portland.
