Long Bell To Clean Pond

WEED—Operation will start next Monday, May 4, on cleaning and enlarging the log pond of the Long Bell Lumber Company in Weed. The pond comprises an approximate 15 acres at the present time and will be enlarged 30 per cent according to John Mantle, general manager of the plant.

This will be the first time in 25 years the pond has been cleaned and it is anticipated that there will be logs dug from the bottom of the pond that have been there for much of this period of time. However the general manager states that logs that have been

under water for many years do not deteriorate and the timber will be just as valuable for use as that of those recently placed in the pond.

The pond is being enlarged in order to provide more space for logs so that more uniform output and employment may be maintained throughout the year. At the present time, when winter snows down logging operations in the woods, the plant runs low on material and of a necessity employment is cut and output curtailed.

With several more acres added to the pond, a larger stock of logs will be available for use and production kept on an even keel. The cleaning of the pond will require the closing of the mill but only about 70 men out of 1,400 employed by the Long-Bell Lumber
