**PORTLAND** — The City Council here is going to vote to let up to the State Liquor Commission to determine where to put the 140 to 150 licenses for liquor by the drink in Portland.

The council made that clear Thursday by approving another 52 amendments. That pushed the total number of amendments to 136. Many more will go. The state agency eventually will have to cut the list to 140 or 150.

Councilmen said they did not like the liquor commission's policy of limiting liquor licenses for restaurants to those that have big kitchens.

"Are the big restaurants to have a monopoly on the liquor business in the state?" asked Commissioner Stanley Earl.

"From now on I'm going to vote for every one, whether it has a kitchen or not," said Commissioner Ormond Bean.

In the end, though, the council backed at one place serving popcorn.

"As far as I am concerned, popcorn is not a food," said Earl.

Cunningham told reporters he intends to go ahead with his proposal to divorce the double-duty State Board of Equalization from liquor administration. His bill to establish a separate liquor authority will be introduced by the Senate Governmental Efficiency Committee Thursday.

Cunningham said William G. Ronelli, Board of Equalization chairman, has indicated he hasn't changed his mind and still favors the separate agency. Paul R. Leake, assistant land member recently appointed by Warren, is supporting the legislation. The five-man elected board is a tax collection and equalization agency as well as a liquor authority.

Sen. R. B. Beaumont, a noted advocate of the measure, said that liquor lobbyist Arthur H. Samish is strongly opposed to the
