## Service Clubs Back Drive For Prayers For Peace

Over 8 million members of the nation's largest civic and veterans organizations will join forces May 3 to offer a united prayer for world peace. Horace E. Henderson, president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, announced today.

The program, titled "Operation Pray" was originated in March by the U. S. Jaycees to assist churches in bringing about a national-wide religious reawakening. In recent weeks the reawakening has been aided by the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Lions and Kiwanis have offered their full support to Operation Pray, thereby initiating for the first time a consolidated religious effort on the part of major service organizations.

## Federal Job Roster Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — A drop of more than 20,000 in the government's civilian payroll in March, the first full month of the Eisenhower administration's new check-rein on federal employment, was reported Friday.

There were two reports—from the Civil Service Commission and the Senate-House Committee on reduction of Nonessential Federal Expenditures—and the figures, although generally in harmony, were not precisely alike.

Sen. Byrd (D-Va.), chairman of the committee, noted, however, that his group's figures are based in part on tentative totals.

The Civil Service Commission's report showed 23,000 civilian workers dropped from the payroll in March; total employment by the executive agencies to 2,528,400 on April 1. Byrd's committee said a 20,155 reduction in March left the total at 2,526,619.

Either way, it was the largest monthly payroll reduction since the Korean War began in mid-1950.

## Error Costs Judge Sleep

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — A typographical error cost county judge Walter Marks a night's sleep.

The error in the court docket set preliminary trial for a few patent cases for 1:30 a. m., instead of the afternoon.

The judge decided to be in the court room, just in case "some wiseacre would show up at that hour and claim the court was in error."

Marks arrived at the darkened courtroom 1:30 sharp, sat in solitude until 2, then recessed until the afternoon.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Police announced Friday one of Malaysia's top Communist terrorists has been assassinated by his own bodyguard, who later surrendered carrying the victim's head.

The slain leader was Ah Kok, a member of the Malayan Communist Party's central committee.

## Claire Trevor Plays Part Okay, But Family Unhappy

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Claire Trevor has won an Academy Award and a lay fortune from playing fallen women on the screen, but her family can't get used to the idea.

"I have some aunts and other relatives in the East," said the actress. "Very dignified people. They often write me and say, 'Why can't they let you play nice girls in pictures, dear?'"

Her 63-year-old father feels the same way, only stronger. He was a conservative Fifth Avenue tailor to highborn New Yorkers. He was taken aback when his daughter went on the stage.

"When I first started smoking at the age of 22," she recalled, "he was shocked. He told me, 'If you must smoke, don't do it in my presence.' I had to smoke in my room after that."

He has seldom mentioned the fact that she was in the movies, much less the kind of roles she plays.

For a gal with such a conservative background, it's remarkable that Claire has been repeatedly cast as a woman of elastic virtue. She traces it back to her early days under contract to 20th-Fox.

"I either played the dashing girl reporter who cleaned up the town or the leader of a pack of gangsters," she remarked. "Then I played fallen women in 'Dead End' and 'Stagecoach.' That did it."

She almost escaped the type in the '30s. After leaving Fox, she did a couple of films at Warner. The studio was high on her and wanted her to sign a term contract. The publicity department promised her a glamor buildup, advertising her as the "Gomph Girl."

"But I was afraid of term con-

tracts after my experience Fox," she said. "Nobody was thumbed about me when I left there, and the attitude changed."

So she passed up the Warner deal, and Ann Sheridan got the job as the girl with Gomph.

Claire is back at the old job in "I Ride Alone" with Ray Milland. She plays a New Orleans belle who has worked her way up the river as a card sharp.

## Blast Cause Sought Today

PEABODY, Mass. (AP) — Investigators Friday probed through the ruins of what once was a chemical plant to try to learn the source of a terrific explosion which took one life and injured some 30 others.

The explosion ruptured a bubble in the American Polymer Corporation while more than a score of persons were at work there Thursday.

It also blew out every window and parts of the roof of the Resinous Chemicals Corp., a subsidiary firm, located next door across a 20-foot parking lot.

The blast also broke windows as far as a half-mile away and its roar could be heard five miles distant.

The victim was Frederick Lawson, 33, a foreman at the Polymer plant, whose body was found in the parking lot, obviously hurled out of the cement-block building by the explosion.

Nine persons were still hospitalized. About 20 others were released from hospitals after treatment.

LONDON (AP) — A big red double-decker bus skidded in a rainy drizzle Friday and plowed into a shop front on a crowded west end street.

A man and a woman were trapped on the sidewalk and killed. Thirteen other persons were hurt, including the bus driver and conductor.
