

Medford Whips Pels on Track

Moad Batters State Record in Shot Put

Medford displayed its expected power in field events yesterday and came up with surprising strength in the sprints to whip Klamath Falls, 65-1-10 to 56-9-10, in a dual meet run in sub-freezing weather on Modoc Field.

The Pelicans had closed the gap to seven points when the Tornados scored an unexpected sweep in the 220-yard dash, shutting out Calvin Gilmore, as Burt Williams won the race, followed by teammates Goodman and Davis.

Gilmore also figured for a win in the 100-yard dash, settled for second behind Goodman.

Jim Dougherty also failed to win the points the dope sheet had him down for. Dougherty won the broad jump with a nice leap of 19-11 but drew a blank in the high hurdles, and century.

All in all, the Pels showed nicely against the vaunted power of the Tornados and the blame couldn't be placed on any one boy in weather not synonymous with track and field.

There were no double winners. Duane Goodman, with his win the shot put and second in the 220, was high with eight points. Jimmy Bevans supplied one of the top thrills of the meet, winning the low hurdles with a burst of speed after clearing the last stick. He just nipped Medford's Doug Crippen.

After drawing a blank in the 220-yard dash, the Pelican quartet of Bevans, Gilmore and the Mills brothers, Don and Clint, won with room to spare in the 580-yard relay.

Medford's Jack Moad didn't even shake his sweat clothes as he won the shot put with a heave of 54 feet, 2 3/4 inches. That betters the state record more than an inch.

MIDWAY, O. P.—Dick Bogert, 16-year-old junior of Midway High School, set an all-time individual single game scholastic basketball scoring record when he tallied 120 points in a game. Stars Blank Beavers, 5-0, Behind O'Donnell

When Portland runs out of left-handed pitchers Hollywood southpaw outfielder Ted Beard will take a turn at bat and see if he can hang out his 13th consecutive hit. That situation should come about in the second game of Friday night's doubleheader between Portland and Hollywood.

Beard, who fired the Pacific Coast League record of 12 successive hits Tuesday night, was rained out Wednesday, and Thursday night manager Clay Hopper of Portland fired his southpaw ace, Glenn Elliott, at the Stars. Elliott gave way after six innings but Hopper sent in Royce Lint, another southpaw.

The Stars won the game, 5-0, on rookie right-hander George O'Donnell's five-hitter.

Portland will start Jehosie Beard, another lefty, in Friday night's first game, but Lyman Lunde, a right-hander, has been nominated for the second. Hollywood's victory advanced the stars a full game in the standings, since Los Angeles and Seattle both lost Thursday night.

Fishing Hangs On Weather

PORTLAND (P)—Fishing conditions are expected to be generally good in Central Oregon lakes and streams which open Saturday, the State Game Commission reported Thursday.

Weather conditions will determine success in Odell, Crescent, Blue and Suttle Lakes and Wickup and Ochoco Reservoirs, the commission said in its weekly report. Fishing is expected to be fair in Odell and Crescent Lakes.

Although the Deschutes River is high above Bend, prospects are good for fishing. The stream is clear below Bend. The Little Deschutes above Crescent Creek is in good condition. The Metolius River is in excellent condition. All streams in the Crooked River system are high and muddy.

COLD

In Northwest Oregon where the season opened earlier, Mt. Hood area streams are still generally very cold, but some good catches have been made. North Willamette Valley streams are in excellent condition. Bass and spinners are producing good catches in most streams. Flies are good in low warmer streams. Fishing has been fair on the McKenzie and its tributaries and on the upper Willamette and tributaries. Streams along the north coast are higher than normal and slightly murky with fishing fair.

In Southwest Oregon fishing in central coastal streams is poor. Some limits have been taken from central coastal lakes. Fishing in southern coastal streams and lakes is only fair. Salmon fishing has been good on the lower Rogue. Water conditions appear good in the Rogue area for trout fishing. Fish and Squaw Lakes are expected to yield good catches.

MUDDY

In the northeast rivers are high and muddy but there may be some clearing this week end. Smaller tributaries in the Grande Ronde and Baker Valleys are clearing.

In the southeast Lake County streams are expected to be high and only except for the Anna River. Best catches probably will be made in the Anna reservoir. Malheur and Bewah reservoirs should be very good. Owyhee Reservoir is producing large catches of bass and crappies.
