Cattle Drive Reaches Fort

PORT KLAMATH—Consigned to the water range at Red Bluff to south of Fort Klamath, the cattle drive of 800 head of yearling steers on Saturday, May 2, necessitated the first of the cattle drive of the spring season, when on the following day, the cattle were driven from Fort Klamath to the Chiloquin railroad stock pen at 7:15 a. m. to start herding the Whiteface Herefords to their seasonal pasture in the meadows of the Dixon-Temple ranch (probably better known to oldtimers as the "Cattle Camp"). The cattle were turned out to graze at the Dixon ranch at approximately four p. m. requiring nearly nine hours of riding herd by a group of men to make the trip of about 14 miles in all.

Participating in the drive were Ben Davis, Robert Gordon, Ash Morrow, William C. Martin, Ralph Vaden, Walter Wike and Emmett Bennett.

Another big rail shipment of cattle arrived at Chiloquin Tuesday, when 25 carloads of stock were consigned from the ranch of the Hawaiian Cattle Co., Hollister, Calif., to Thomas W. Hawkins, Fort Klamath, for pasture at the local company ranch located in the south of the valley.

Mr. and Mrs. Hawkins drove up Tuesday evening from Hollister, California to be on hand to personally meet with the driving of the nearly 100 head of cattle from Chiloquin to the ranges of the extensive Hawaiian Cattle Co. ranch here, and Mrs. Hawkins for a week's visit before returning to Hollister.

Cumulative with the spring influx of cattle by truck and on the hoof, the annual exodus of thousands of the wild geese to northern nesting grounds got underway Sunday, then continuously all day, long strings of geese flying in single formation behind the V-shaped vanguards in the lead, winged their way north to the constant accompaniment of the characteristic gabbled noise of the wild fowl. The heavy northward migration of Sunday left Wood River Valley practically deserted by geese, and on Monday, just a few small bands were observed flying high over the valley on their way to northern climes.

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Taft-Hartley Law Changes Suggested

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fred A. Hartley Jr., gave the House Labor Committee Tuesday his recommendations on proposed changes in the Taft-Hartley Act, one of them calling for a change in its name.

Now a business consultant here and at Pittsboro, N. J., Hartley was chairman of the House Labor Committee in the 80th Congress, which passed the labor law. He did not seek re-election from his New Jersey district in 1946.

He said he is proud to have his name associated with the law but thinks it should be called something else after it is changed.

"The attacks upon the law have been so violent that the name of its author has become a symbol of evil in the minds of many American workers who have not been able to learn the truth about this law," he said.

The act, he went on, has been called a great many things.

"And I might add, so have its author."

He added:

"It has been described as a slave-labor law; a diabolical conspiracy; and only recently the nation's No. 1 oil burner salesman, Mr. John L. Lewis, said, the law is damnable and despicable, ridiculous and insulting, discriminatory, punitive, restrictive, repressive, compulsive and oppressive."

Then Hartley said he would hardly regard the United Mine Workers president as "a master of understatement."

His other suggestions included: Continue the provision dealing with jurisdictional strikes.

Change the secondary boycott provision to prevent employers or unions from taking advantage of it.

Continue the ban on strikes against the federal government and make both labor and management responsible for complying with contracts.

Strengthen a ban against "feather-bedding" and improve the curb against mass picketing.

Strengthen provisions dealing with industry-wide and nation-wide strikes.

Define more clearly the spheres of authority of federal and state labor laws and cut out federal interference with state laws dealing with picketing and utility strikes.

Enlarge membership of the National Labor Relations Board to seven or nine. It now has five members.

Eastern US Suffers Wet Atmosphere

Most of today's wet and cloudy weather was confined to areas in the eastern half of the nation. Clear skies and rising temperatures were in prospect for most of the western half.

Thunderstorms continued in parts of the southeastern states but it was fair in Florida. Rain fell from Eastern Kansas and Missouri east and northeastward over a band extending through most of Pennsylvania and into Western New York.

The rain extended over the southern edge of the Great Lakes region as far east as Lake Erie and south of the Ohio River into Tennessee and Kentucky. Elsewhere in the eastern part of the country skies were partly cloudy to cloudy.

Four small tornadoes, skipped through sections of Mississippi yesterday, but no persons were injured seriously. Several homes and business places were damaged.

The Sabine River on the Texas-Louisiana border was out of its banks, threatening floods in four small Southeast Texas towns. Most serious threat was at Deweyville, where residents of about 100 homes were evacuated yesterday.

YOUTH CUT DURING FIGHT

Robert Kirk, 19, Chiloquin, was in Klamath Valley Hospital today suffering from 11 lacerations on various parts of his body. Sheriff's officers said Paul Wampler, 57, Chiloquin rancher had admitted having an altercation with the youth last night but had not admitted cutting the boy.

At the hospital today, young Kirk was reported as in good condition. Most of the cuts were shallow flesh wounds although there was one deep wound in the back of the neck.

Sheriff Murray Britton said he had been told this story of the fracas near Chiloquin on the bank of the Williamson River.

Wampler, while working in one of his pastures late yesterday afternoon, saw his horse "Topper" crossing the river. When Wampler went to the opposite side of the river to get the horse, he found young Kirk with the horse. Accounts vary as to what happened then, Wampler says someone struck him and Kirk says he doesn't remember much of what happened.

Wampler said that when he first approached Kirk, the boy told him he was going to keep the horse. Kirk's father, Francis Kirk, says the boy had been riding the horse a bit and that he had told the boy to take the horse back across the river. The elder Kirk says his son was trying to get the horse back across the river when Wampler arrived.

No complaint had been requested by either party at noon today, according to District Attorney Frank Alderson.
