## Gas Pipeline Talks Set For Later

PORTLAND (AP) — Pacific Northwest gas distributors will meet in Vancouver, B. C., later this month to discuss again the merits of various plans for piping natural gas to the region.

They spent Tuesday talking about them but reached no agreement.

Several firms are seeking licenses to build pipelines. But major gas distributors have not agreed on which of the pipeline proposals would be their primary.

The Portland Gas and Coke Company favors piping gas from the Peace River area of Canada. Carl Clum, press spokesman for Charles A. Guelffroy, Portland Gas and Coke president, said after the Tuesday meeting of distributors.

Seattle Gas Co., which had three representatives at the meeting, prefers a pipeline from the San Juan Basin fields in New Mexico and Colorado.

Both firms are expected to continue arguments supporting their plans at the Vancouver meeting scheduled for some time between May 29 and 31.

Other firms represented at the meeting here were: British Columbia Electric of Vancouver, B. C.; Washington Gas & Electric, serving Tacoma, Everett, Chehalis, Centralia and Olympia; Bellingham, Wenatchee and Bremerton gas companies; Northwest Cities Gas, serving Walla Walla, Yakima, Pendleton and Eugene; and United Gas, serving Camas and Washougal.

Kinney said the school officials report that in some schools, children have been quitting their classes in wholesale lots. One union high school in Marion County reported 15 per cent of its students have dropped out to work in the fields.

During the school year, children

under 16 can work only outside of school hours. All children under 18 years old have to attend school unless they have finished high school.

"There is no excuse for farmers to raid schools for field labor at this time since there is a surplus of adult workers readily available

any farmer needing help," Kinney said.

"The schools have cooperated with the farmers by arranging their schedules for early closing. By the time the farm labor situation does become tight, children will be out of school and ready to help farmers harvest crops,"

## More Rain Slated For South, East

More rain appeared in prospect for areas in the East, Southeast and Midwest today as summerlike weather continued in the western half of the country.

There were only a few wet spots in the midcontinent. One wet belt extended over Southern Iowa, Northern Missouri and Eastern Kansas. Showers also hit sections of Southern Wisconsin and North-eastern Illinois.

Showers in the East extended from Georgia northward to Southern Maine. There was drizzle or light rain in parts of the Middle Atlantic and Southeastern states.

Fair and warm weather was reported yesterday west of the Rockies with mild temperatures in the Plains states. The nation's top mark was 94 at San Diego, Calif., while the 94 at Los Angeles was a record for the date. The hot weather also was in the Pacific Northwest.

Floodwaters from rising rivers continued to menace sections of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Texas.

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## Boy Left In Rail Station

PORTLAND (AP) — Police reported Tuesday that a mother lost her 4-year-old son in the Union Station here Saturday, but didn't notify them until she had arrived at Woodland, Calif.

The boy, Julian Munar, was found wandering in the station Saturday and turned over to juvenile authorities. One of them, Ronald McKenzie, took him home.

McKenzie said the mother, Mrs. Evelyn Munar, called Portland later from Woodland to report the boy lost. Mrs. Munar and her husband work in an apparatus field at the King Ranch near Woodland.

The juvenile court plans to investigate the case, McKenzie said.
