Pole Frame Buildings OK

Life-expectancy of low-cost pole frame farm buildings may be as high as 35 years if pressure treated poles are used, says M. G. Huber, extension agricultural engineering specialist at Oregon State College. Buildings made with home treated poles should last for 15 to 20 years or more where decayed stumps or the poles are replaced with new butt.

Growing popularity of pole frame buildings—both round and square poles—stems from low initial cost, particularly from less-skilled labor required for construction.

A disadvantage of pole construction is that some designs lack sufficient bracing to withstand high winds or heavy snow loads which may weaken joints and loosen roofing, especially metal roofing.

Insufficient nailing or fastening of rafters or nailing strips is the chief cause of roofs "blowing up" from underneath wind pressure. The specialist points out, however, the well-designed structures will withstand excessive winds.

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State Turkey Growers Note Need For Late Poults

Use of artificial light on breeder turkeys to bring them into earlier production has been so successful among Oregon turkey growers that it may have over-shot its mark, according to Noel Bension, extension poultry specialist at Oregon State college.

Wide-spread use of artificial light during the past few years in Oregon and other states has brought a majority of hens into production during January and February with a surplus of early hatching eggs and poults. The result has been a slight shortage of hatching eggs during March, April and May.

"The few growers who have not put their hens under lights this year stand to make more money on their late hatching eggs," says the specialist. He adds that these growers are getting more eggs, better fertility and hatchability at a time when demand for late eggs has been on the upswing.

Although demand remains heavy for early poults which mature for the pre-Thanksgiving market, Bension sees need for some reduction. A slight shift to later poults would bring better balance on fall and winter markets with later turkeys coming in for the Christmas trade.

Bension points out that late-hatched poults can also be used

as breeders with good results. The poults are hatched in late May or

June and require less feed to try them through to the hatching season. Breeders should be at least eight months when they begin laying to maximum production, hatchability, says the specialist.

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
