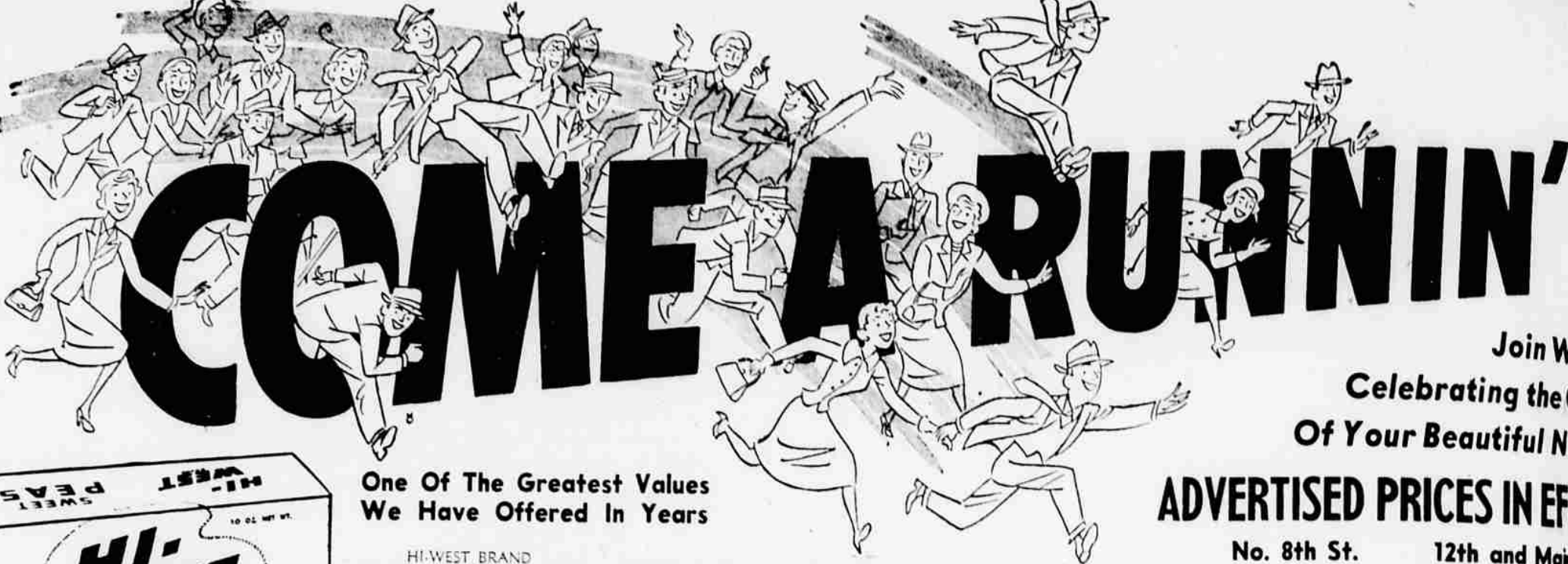

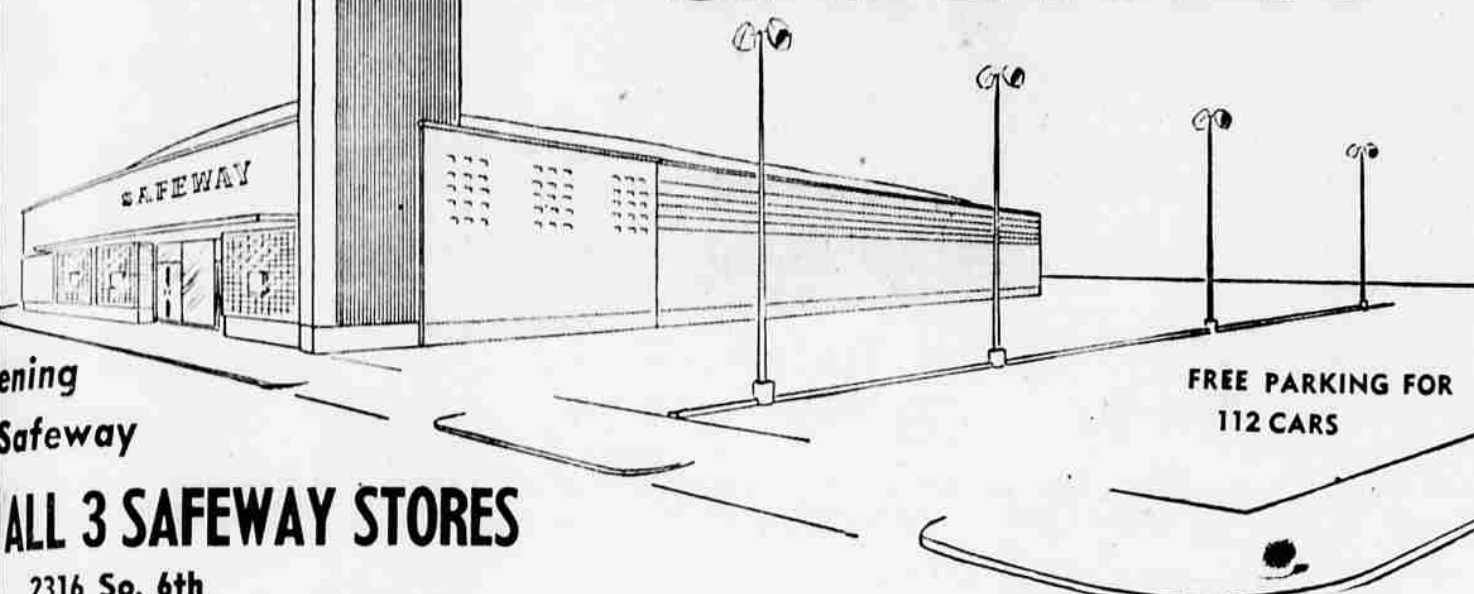

Controversial Tidelands Bill May Speed Up, Be On President's Desk Quickly

WASHINGTON (AP)—The bill to give the states title to oil-laden submerged lands off their shores, debated in the Senate for more than a month, may pick up marked speed and wind up within a few days on the desk of President Eisenhower, who has indicated he will sign it.

The measure which the Senate passed, 86-13, late Tuesday, after an acrimonious debate which started April 1, differs in one major respect and some minor ones from the measure approved earlier by the House.

But efforts were being made to persuade the House Republican leadership that the best course would be for the House to accept the Senate version, rather than risk a new Senate talkfest over a compromise.

No action was likely today, since the House scheduled only memorial services for members and former members who have died in the past year. But tomorrow, it is likely that the House will be asked to accept the Senate measure. If it does so, the bill would go to the White House.

Before approving the bitterly fought legislation, subject of over 1 1/2 million words of floor debate in the longest Senate battle in 15 years, the Senate batted down every one of a dozen amendments offered by opponents.

They contended they were trying to cancel or modify what they termed a giant "giveaway" of federal property over which the Supreme Court has held that the federal government holds paramount rights. Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.), an opponent, said oil in the lands involved has been estimated by geologists to be worth from 50 to 300 billion dollars.

The bill was drafted on the other hand, as a matter of justice to the states which, opponents said, had assumed for 150 years that they owned the submerged lands within their historic boundaries.

The states with proved offshore oil are California, Texas and Louisiana. The bill would recognize state ownership of all submerged lands within historic state boundaries. Although not spelled out, the bill usually has been taken to mean three miles except on the Gulf coasts of Texas and Florida, which claim give the states title to oil-laden submerged lands off their shores.

Another section would give the states the right to develop oil, gas and other natural resources in the ocean bed if the courts should dispute the right of Congress to transfer title.

The federal government would have oil and other mineral rights in the continental shelf, the area running outward from state boundaries to where the ocean floor drops off sharply. In some places this is as far out as 300 miles.

The House bill provides that the secretary of the interior should administer the continental shelf; the Senate version makes no provision for its administration. The Senate plans to handle that issue in separate legislation.

Rep. J. Frank Wilson (D-Tex.), a backer of state ownership, said he preferred the House "package" treatment, but that after talking with Senate leaders he considers the wiser course for the House to accept the Senate bill.

Weather Stations To Be Reduced

WASHINGTON (AP)—W. F. McDonald, assistant chief of the Weather Bureau said Wednesday four weather stations have been closed and 36 more ordered closed to conform to budget cuts by the House.

If further cuts made Tuesday by the House are finally adopted, McDonald said, the bureau will be forced to close another 6 to 7 stations by July 1.

McDonald said the stations already closed include Tacoma, Wash.; Washington, and Troutdale, and Baker, Oregon.

Stations ordered closed by July 1, in addition to the four already shut down, include Ellensburg, Kelso and North Bend, Wash.; Cordova and Galena, Alaska.

McDonald said the closing means that weather observations "will be hurt" but "we are trying to protect essential services that are threatened and hope to be able to do so."

He said service reductions would be felt most keenly in the bureau's upper air observation program and that this would be "especially damaging" to storm and tornado warnings.

McDonald said regular local weather forecasts would continue to be available in all towns where stations were closed. By shifting responsibility to nearby stations, and that the Civil Aeronautics Administration would take over observation in some places where information is gathered for aircraft movements.
