Bible Scholar Coming Here

The Rev. Herman B. Cents, dean of Grace Institute for Biblical Education, Oklahoma City, will be at the Bible Baptist Church for a 5-day Bible conference Sunday morning and night May 10th through the 15th.
 The Rev. Cents is an American of Russian origin, descending from a long line of Hebrew scholars and mystics. He was educated in Rabbinical literature and in the arts at the University of Odessa, his native city on the Black Sea. He came to the United States in 1913 and in that same year became a Christian.
 For over a quarter of a century, the Rev. Cents has been in the service of Christian education, pastor and Bible teacher. He has traveled widely, repeatedly visiting Soviet Russia and satellite countries now behind the Iron Curtain. As a result he is intimately conversant with the world, and especially European conditions.
 The Rev. Cents will speak on the theme: "The Ancient Prophets and our Modern Problems."

INJUNCTION

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New Municipal Code For Dorris Adopted At City Council Meeting May 8

DORRIS—At a special meeting of the Dorris City Council, May 8, a new municipal code was adopted, with a few reservations. The code was presented by Robert Vollmer of San Francisco, law student, who is preparing himself for the California bar. He is being helped in his various projects, of which this is one, by the League of California Cities.
 The code will replace the old ordinance book. In essence the laws will not be changed but the new code is deemed a simpler form, with many of the obsolete or outmoded laws being deleted.
 Raising of business licenses was discussed and it was decided to leave this particular part of the code to the discretion of the council. Councilmen Joe Shelley and Woodie Wilson are to study license fees of other cities.
 Fire Chief Joe Young responded to a telephone call and explained a model fire code which he had previously left with them for study and discussion. It was adopted. Young had informed the council that Fire Underwriters had objected to fire ordinance No. 100, saying that it was ineffective.
 Councilmen present at the special session were Shelley, Wilson, O. M. Wallace, Betty Gravier and Mayor A. E. McLaughlin.
 At the council's regular session Monday evening, May 4, discussion centered on complaint by the Associated Lumber and Box Company that it had been paying assessments on unimproved property in the Mitchell Addition for some 20-odd years. The council was asked to furnish water and street work for Lots 10, 11, 18, 19 and 20 in the Mitchell Addition or take the property off the assessment list. Councilman Shelley promised that if the proposed bond issue for the water project passes, the lots in question would have water, and that a Yreka surveyor will be contacted to make a road or street survey of said property.
 City Clerk Paddy Hoskins was instructed to write the State Division of Highways to see if the state will allow the city to fix Third Street, which was paved last year and suffered great damage through the winter months, or if the special gas tax fund. And if grading and surveying of the Mitchell Addition streets can come out of the same fund. Mrs. Hoskins also was asked to write the Division of Highways to see if crosswalks can be made at First, Third and Fourth streets as was done at Macedo.
 Discussion was made of a great deal of water being used in the city limits and not paid for by several residents. It was decided that a canvass should be made of the city and all water users put on the current water list.

Frey Named As Paper's Publisher
