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Two Glamour Gals Quit Studios, Fare Out Again

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Today's double feature stars two glamour girls who just parted company with their studios after a decade of service.

The girls are Jeanne Crain and June Allyson. Although they are different types, they have much in common. Both started film contracts in their teens and reached great success as portrayals of the All-American Girl. Neither has made a movie away from her home studio. After 10 years of contracts, both asked for and won freedom in the same week.

Soon after Miss Crain left 20th Century-Fox, I called on her at the Hollywood hilltop estate she shares with her four young sons and her husband, manufacturer Paul Brinkman.

"I've never been so excited," she remarked. "Within two hours after the news of my leaving Fox, I had offers for two plays and three pictures." Her first assignment will be to make "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" in Europe in July.

Her break with the studio doesn't show the usual pattern. Her option had just been picked up for another year at a salary estimated around \$3,000 weekly. But she said she talked the studio into letting her go.

"I was grateful for pictures like 'Home in Indiana,' 'State Fair' and 'Margie.' 'Pinky' was certainly a challenge. But then I had to do 'Cheaper by the Dozen.' I realize it was a big money-maker but it didn't help me to go back to pictures."

"I think the movie business is entering its greatest era," she commented. "The new processes will make business better than ever. I'm not at all worried about the future."

Neither is June Allyson. When I visited her 58-acre Mandeville Canyon estate, she was as happy as a starlet with a new contract.

"I cried for two days after I left MGM," she remarked cheerfully.

But after the shock wore off, I have never been more elated. I've already lined up four pictures, all of them with wonderful scripts. And I can hardly wait to go to work for Richard." That's her husband, once a crooner named Dick Powell, but now a producer-director at RKO.

She liked films such as "Two Girls and a Sailor," "The Stratton Story" and "Little Women," but these were too many turkeys in between. When she found the studio had nothing planned for her during the coming year, she wanted a release. She still has two films to do there under her deal, which would have expired in September.

Mental Diseases Broken Down To Religious Groups

LOS ANGELES (AP)—If you have a mental disease or are going to get one, the odds are that your religion will indicate the nature of the ailment.

A massive study reported to the American Psychiatric Association Friday shows that the psychoneuroses are the principal ailments of Jews; that alcoholism and epilepsy are prevalent among Catholics; and that Protestants are burdened with still other mental disorders.

The study was made by a group at Yale University and was reported by Dr. Bertram H. Roberts and Dr. Jerome K. Myers. The whole New Haven area was surveyed for mental cases under treatment. The search covered a metropolitan population of 235,000 people.

Multiple Personality Gal Puzzles Doctors In Tests

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A demure, pretty brunette who turned into a daredevilish, irresponsible creature in front of her doctor and later into a bright, agreeable, conscientious girl, was described today by the nation's psychiatrists.

This girl now has three different personalities, changeable at will. She is married and has a small child, but she denies her husband and child whenever she turns into anything except the shy young housewife who first sought medical attention two years ago for terrific headaches.

The unusual case was reported to the American Psychiatric Association in a medical report as well as in color movies by Dr. Corbett H. Thigpen and Dr. Hervey M. Cleckley of Augusta, Ga.

The case is not unique. About 100 such instances of multiple personalities in single individuals have been reported. But Dr. Thigpen's presentation was medically interesting because of the provocative personal relationships involved.

The young woman identified only as Eve White, an alias, changed suddenly about a year ago. She said she had been hearing voices. She asked if she might be going insane. A queer look spread over her face and in a couple of seconds she changed into a coquettish character who winked and said, "Hi."

Dr. Thigpen named the personality involved in this change Eve Black. Eve Black goes to parties, drinks too much sometimes, and occasionally turns back into Eve White and seems horrified at finding herself in the middle of drunken gaiety.

Eight months after Eve Black's dramatic appearance, the girl blossomed out with a third personality. Dr. Thigpen said, which was something more than a blend of the other two.

Eve Black went out with men casually, got a job as a night club entertainer, bought and changed expensive clothes. The third personality called Jane, took the

Unity Drive In Russia My Be Sign of Internal Struggle; More to Come

A campaign for internal unity, begun just after Premier Georgi M. Malenkov took over, has reached such a furious peak in the Soviet press as to suggest some sort of internal crisis. This campaign may explain the sometimes bewildering Soviet peace offensive, as well as a tightening up of the Soviet Communist party and government.

By the beginning of May, almost every domestic item in Soviet organs had something to do with the theme of the "invaluable unity of the Soviet people."

Interwoven was the theme of the superiority of the Russian people proper and the debt owed them by peoples of the 15 other Soviet republics. The press inveighed violently against "bourgeois nationalism"—meaning nationalism in any dependent Soviet republic—and "cosmopolitanism," an old description of Jews with Zionist overtones.

Repeated over and over again was this theme: "So long as the friendship of peoples exists and flourishes, we need fear no enemies."

There is great stress on "rights guaranteed by the Soviet constitution, and upon the idea of 'equal rights of all races and nations.'"

The home front propaganda suggests that with Stalin's death there were restless stirrings among the peoples of the Ukraine, White Russia, the three Baltic states and the republics of Central Asia. All are being mentioned specifically.

This may explain the general tightening up under the Malenkov regime. Each republic government got a shakeup. Russian took over key positions in the republic governments, and the security forces were overhauled in each. The Communist party itself apparently was pruned.

This also could explain the peace offensive. Previous peace campaigns were aimed primarily at convincing people abroad of peaceful Soviet intentions. This one seems equally concerned with convincing the people at home that war is not at hand.

In the shadow of possible war, two things might have happened within the Soviet republics: war threat might have brought the traditional fatalistic attitude—war is coming, so slay—back. It could have those "remnants" of nations of whom the press speaks, to their cause is not lost. The threat of the Soviet Union might have recalled the defects of the last war, the dreaded German enemy.
