Mossadegh Government Wins Estate

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — A royal decree announced Monday the transfer of the Shah's privately-held estates to the government of Premier Mohammad Mossadegh. This is another victory for Mossadegh in his campaign to bring the royal court under complete government domination.

The payment specified is 60 million rials—about two million dollars at the official rate, or \$800,000 at the current unofficial rate. The money will be spent on charities by the Royal Institute for Social Services, but the funds will be under government supervision.

David Shiel Dies Saturday

David Storey (Scotty) Shiel, born Nov. 22, 1874, at Langburn, Shiel, Hawick, Scotland, world-famous for his woolen mill industry, died late Saturday afternoon, May 9, following a lengthy illness. He had made his home at 79 Pine Street.

He was married there, Sept. 4, 1900 to Jeannie Davidson. Of this union, three children were born, David, Ella and Jean. The latter, Mrs. Bernice Rawlins, Klamath Falls, who with the widow survive him.

Mr. Shiel became affiliated with Canongate Kirk, M.A. 2, 1111 E. Lodge No. 2, AFAM, Edinburgh, in early life but did not transfer his membership to this country.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday, May 12, 2 p.m. from the Chapel of Ward's Klamath Funeral Home with the Rev. David Barnett, First Presbyterian Church officiating. Commitment service and interment in Klamath Memorial Park.

Pallbearers will be Fred Stemple, Emmitt Susemore, Rod Smith, Joe Durchea, William Anderson and Joe Leonard.

Scholarships Draw Okay

PORTLAND (AP) — The High School Relativity Committee of the State System of Higher Education Saturday announced approval of 609 scholarships.

Names of the recipients will be announced May 17. The scholarships are for high school seniors and college students in Oregon, four other states, Alaska, Hawaii and 21 countries.

All scholarships pay only partial costs except for a number available for teacher training at the three colleges of education.

Distribution of scholarships—Oregon State 164, University of Oregon 74, Oregon College of Education 119, Southern Oregon 72, Eastern Oregon 71, Portland State 48, Medical School 7, Nursing School 6, Dental School 2.

Recall Petitions Out In School Row

ROSEBURG (AP) — Petitions asking recall elections for two members of the Roseburg School Board are being circulated here.

The petitions contend that N. D. Johnson, board chairman, and W. G. Clarenbach, a board member, are "anti-teacher" and that they were slow in setting up new district accounting procedures.

Both men denied the charges. They and the rest of the board drew some criticism recently for refusing to renew the contracts of six teachers.

Boys Club Incorporated

A new nonprofit corporation, which has been named Paul's Boys' Club, has been incorporated under Oregon laws.

Trustees include the founder, Paul S. Dumvill, who is director of the club; William W. Dunn, 378 S. Bellevue, Langhorne, Pa., and Mrs. Raymond A. Gates, 26 Ridley, Norwood, Pa. Articles of incorporation were drawn up by L. Orin Susemore.

Three Die In Auto Wrecks

 Three persons were injured fatally in automobile accidents in Oregon Sunday.

Mr. Bert Basche of Baker and her teenage daughter died when their car struck a bridge railing at Highway 60 miles east of Baker. Mrs. Basche, who was driving, was killed outright. The daughter, Kay, died 20 minutes after the crash.

Fred Winburn, 61, Mill City, was killed when a car in which he was a passenger plunged off the Santiam Highway near Detroit Dam.

The driver of the car, Joe Galtender, 59, of Mill City, and another passenger, were not badly hurt.

Conger Field Work Donated

Bob Bonney, city recreation director, reported Monday that Conger Field has been placed in excellent condition with the use of 450 yards of clay and dirt moved from the hill behind the play center.

He said earth moving equipment donated by Peter Kleis's Sons' Co., and operated by Guy Scott and George Budka, carried on the works. Cross Burned In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — A cross was burned in front of a Negro family home here early Sunday. Sheriff Terry Schunk said it probably was done by someone who wanted the family to move out of the all-white neighborhood.

The family of Charles Grant moved into the neighborhood two weeks ago in spite of protests of some of the district's property owners.

The small wooden cross was set ablaze about 2:30 a.m. The Grant and nearby neighbors said they had not seen the fire being set.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People said it had notified the Federal Bureau of Investigation and State Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton of the incident. Thornton assured the group his office would give full cooperation to the investigation.
