Sprague Road Bids Slated

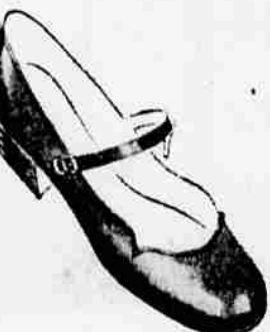

Plans call for construction of four inches of rock base placed on 12-inch rock sub-base previously constructed by Klamath County. The project also includes construction of 20 feet of oil mat wearing surface 11 1/2 inches thick, with 2-foot rock shoulders.
