Taft Writes Change In Labor Law

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Taft of Ohio, the Republican leader, said Friday he is writing a new amendment to the Taft-Hartley Labor Law and hopes to have it ready in a week or so. Taft disclosed this as Democratic members of the Senate Labor Committee chaired by Chairman H. Alexander Smith's (R-N.J.) delay in calling the full committee together to start work on Taft-Hartley Act amendments. Smith has met several times with Republican colleagues on the committee, it was learned, but has shied away from assembling the full committee. Sen. Lehman (D-Ill-N.Y.) said that, together with the Eisenhower administration's silence on its own Taft-Hartley views, was "amazing."

Atom Cannon Tests Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Wilson may go to the Nevada proving grounds next week to witness the first firing of an atomic shell from the Army's huge size cannon. The defense chief already has said he favors increased production of atomic artillery. Now he is trying to arrange his schedule to allow a visit to the nuclear site on May 23, the date of a "live ammunition" test of the 280 millimeter gun over the Frenchman Flats area. Wilson's recent news conference comment that he favored making more of the guns was based on a recommendation by Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens, it was learned Friday. While the exact number is not publishable, it is known that at least a dozen of the huge guns, mounted on tractors which can move across country, have been manufactured so far for the Army. The weapons, which can fire either conventional ammunition or atomic shells, are being organized into two-gun batteries. One such battery is at the Nevada site. A Defense Department spokesman said that, when Wilson said he favored increased production of atomic artillery, he was referring only to the 280 millimeter Army gun. The spokesman said the secretary did not have in mind the use of such guns as part of the armament of naval vessels. The Army has said its E-ton gun "can fit into a landing ship designed for amphibious operations."

The committee's action Friday night was included in a \$1,063,429 cut in the mental hygiene department's budget for 1953-54. The Assembly Ways and Means Committee has approved continuation of the sex crime program through 1954-55. Representative Alan Post had opposed it. Post questioned whether such a program should be state financed. Smith said that was the only way private foundations would be set up to handle such a program. "We're spending millions to make agricultural studies," Smith said. "We ought to be able to spend this relatively small amount for the welfare of the kids."

Radioactivity From Atom Tests Blamed For Wide Range Of Human Mishaps

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (AP) — Prospectors say Western New Mexico is being bombarded with so much radiation from atomic tests that at times it's impossible to test for uranium ore. Fruit growers in Northwestern New Mexico are blaming frosts on atomic tests in Nevada. Residents in one area think a wave of lightheadedness and nausea may have been caused by radioactivity. Atomic Energy Commission officials discount all the complaints. Prospectors in the Gallup, N.M., area, where uranium hunting has reached the proportions of an industry, have been unable to hunt the precious ore at times following tests. The radioactivity count jumped so high that prospectors' Geiger counters couldn't distinguish radioactivity in the air from radioactivity in uranium ore, the prospectors say. A spokesman for fruit growers in San Juan County in Northwestern New Mexico made up a list for newsmen showing that three atomic tests were made between 45 and 60 hours before heavy frost damaged fruit. The first explosion listed, April 6, occurred two days before temperatures fell to 24 degrees, and ruined apricots and peaches. After an explosion May 1, half the apricot crop in the area was frozen. The rest of the peach crop went two days after the May 8 explosion. U. S. Weather Bureau officials in Albuquerque, queried on the fruit growers' theory, said: "Purely a coincidence. We've been having unusual weather throughout the spring." A wave of nausea and lightheadedness among residents of Gallup had doctors puzzled. They disagreed on the question of whether it might have resulted from the radioactivity which at times has ranged up to five times normal. The AEC daily stated there have been no dangerous concentrations of radioactivity fallout in any part of the country outside the controlled area at the Nevada test site. But it added that higher than normal levels of radioactivity have been measured in isolated instances and for short periods of time.

Plans for the 5th annual Klamath Summer Art Workshop on the OTI campus, July 6-31 were announced Saturday. For the first time since its inception, the Klamath school will receive credits at the University of Oregon which are also interchangeable with other educational institutions outside the state. Credits will be under the supervision of Jack Wilkinson, well-known Northwest painter, who studied in France and Switzerland and other art centers on the continent. Wilkinson's work has been exhibited at Salon Nouvelle Realites, Paris. Four term hours may be earned during the session. The credits will be granted through the general extension division of the Oregon State System of Higher Education. Fees are \$25 for two hours credit and \$50 for four hours credit. Students will reside on the OTI campus. Single apartments and dormitory rooms will be available.

EUGENE (AP) — Fire damaged the Golden Palace Restaurant and the Modern Cleaners in downtown Eugene Thursday and Fire Marshal Lester Barker said he was asking the district attorney to join him in seeking to learn the cause. The blaze appeared to have started in a false ceiling between the restaurant and the floor of apartments above. A loaded 44 caliber revolver was found on the restaurant kitchen floor, the marshal said. The restaurant owners, Bill Chung and his son Tom, said they could not account for it. The two adjoining business firms suffered several thousands dollars worth of damage. Several nearby firms reported smoke damage.

Mystery Man Testimony Due

SEATTLE (AP) — The name of its next witness in the trial of seven persons accused of subversion was the government's secret Saturday despite efforts of defense attorneys to force the disclosure of the information. The short legal tangle concluded Federal Court case after the defense surprised the government by not cross examining its fourth major witness. The witness, James H. Taylor, a former Communist who had testified to knowing four of the defendants while a member of the party, was allowed to conclude his testimony with but one brief question from the defense. The government immediately moved for recess until Tuesday, saying it didn't feel enough could be accomplished in a half hour to warrant calling the next witness. Defense Attorney John Caughlan objected and demanded to know the name of the witness. Tracy Griffin, chief of the government's battery of legal talent, refused to name the person and said the defense had excused Taylor just so it could get a line on the identity of the next person on the stand and the trend of his testimony. Caughlan denied this but he didn't learn what he wanted, either.
