Lake School Vote Slated

LAKEVIEW — Voters of Lakeview School District No. 7 will vote Tuesday, May 26, on the matter of extending the six per cent limitation on the 1953-54 budget by \$28,359.49, year ago they approved exceeding the limit by \$25,984.14.

There will be in the Central hall cafeteria from 2 to 6 p. m. and voters who have been notified by the district for at least 10 days may vote.

When the limitation on the district is by \$28,359.49. The voters have already approved two items under the limitation, one of \$34,238 to pay principal and interest on bonds and one of \$35,000, which the third and last item, which is the serial levy. Those figures, added to the amount requested, make a total of \$108,107.50.

Two Die In Car Wrecks

Two men died Friday from injuries suffered in separate traffic accidents in Oregon.

Levi Christner, 67, Portland, was dead on arrival at a hospital after being struck by a car as he was crossing a highway south of Oregon City. State Police Officer Ben Weber identified the driver of the car as Charles Raymond Carter of The Dalles.

Roy Rakestraw, 60, died in a Klamath Falls hospital Friday from injuries suffered Thursday when his car collided with a state police car at an intersection. State Patrolman William Rush, who was driving the police car, suffered only minor injuries. Rush was chasing another motorist at the time of the accident. It was the year's first traffic death in Klamath Falls.

Joe Herwick Death Told

LAKEVIEW — A heart attack claimed the life of Joe Herwick, popular Lake County businessman, Wednesday afternoon, May 13. Mr. Herwick was rushed to the Lakeview Public Hospital Wednesday afternoon and died there 55 minutes later.

His funeral rites will be conducted at the Elks hall at 2 p. m. Saturday, May 16, with the Rev. Lewis Yon officiating. Interment will be at Sunset Park Cemetery. The services will be directed by Ousley-Osterman Mortuary.

Josiah Lafayette Herwick was born June 26, 1905, at Glenwood Springs, Colo., the son of Josiah L. and Ida O. Herwick. He resided in Colorado most of his early life.

On October 26, 1929, Mr. Herwick was married to Dorothy Maloney, Albuquerque, N. M. The family moved to Lakeview in 1941 and for two years Mr. Herwick engaged in logging with local companies. In 1943, he opened a welding and repair shop in K Street North, and sold this operation just a few months ago. He also owned a saddle and stockmen's supply shop on K Street North, which he was operating at time of death.

Mr. Herwick is survived by his wife, Dorothy Herwick, Lakeview; one daughter, Mrs. Peggy Allen, Lakeview; by one brother, Guy Herwick, Grand Valley, Colo.; by three sisters, Mrs. Tiny Duplice, Glenwood Springs, Colo., Mrs. Mary Duplice and Mrs. Susan McLean, Grand Valley, Colo.; a son died in infancy.

Trout Go Into McKay Lake

PORTLAND — Trout are being planted in an Eastern Oregon reservoir this month in the largest lake rehabilitation project ever undertaken by the State Game Commission.

About 200,000 rainbow trout fingerlings are going into McKay Reservoir near Pendleton. The reservoir, over-run by scrap fish, was poisoned last October.

The Game Commission said the poisoning was a success, for the lake recently failed to produce any fish. The poison now has worn off, and the commission expects to open the reservoir to fishing next season.

The commission warned fishermen against using live bait—a practice forbidden by law in inland waters—for that is believed to be the way scrap fish were introduced in the reservoir last time.

Girl Hurt In Leap

A 16-year-old Dorris girl, arrested yesterday on a bad check charge, was seriously injured early last evening when she jumped from a second floor window at the Juvenile Home.

Juvenile authorities said today doctors had told them the girl had injured her back and would have to be placed in a cast.

The girl had been staying at a hotel here since Monday and had, according to police records, cashed a number of checks, most of them for small amounts. Listed as places where she cashed her checks were Houston Beauty Parlor, LaPointes, Melba's Salon of Beauty, Herman's Men's Store, Coast-to-Coast Store, Wong's Cafe, Emporium and Oregon Woolen Store.

At most of the places, the girl had made small purchases and taken the change from her checks. The checks varied in size from \$3 to \$30, police records show.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO — An active hog market this week brought prices to the highest levels since August, 1949, in the face of continued light receipts.

Barrows and gilts were largely 50-60 cents higher and sows 50 cents higher. The salable supply was more than 25 per cent smaller than the corresponding week a year ago. A top of \$25.25 was paid for choice 1 and 2 barrows and gilts scaling to around 260 lbs.

Cattle receipts were five per cent smaller than a week ago, bringing slaughter steers and heifer 25 cents to \$1.00 higher and cows steady to 50 cents higher. Four loads of 1-160 lbs. and 1,165 lbs. Nebraska and Kansas fed steers brought the top of \$24.85.

Vealers were steady to \$1.00 higher and stockers and feeders active, steady to 50 cents higher. Only bulls dropped 50 cents to \$1.50.

Fed sheep lambs predominated the sheep market with receipts about 25,000 lower than last week. Good 1 and 2 skins were steady, but cull to low good fed lambs showed drab and spring lambs were in negligible supply.

Canada Buck Hits New Low

NEW YORK — The Canadian dollar, which has outtrunked the U.S. dollar in value for more than a year, was at its lowest level in 13 months Saturday.

The Dominion dollar was quoted here Friday at 5-16 of a cent above par, the lowest premium since March 24, 1952. In August last year, it commanded a premium of 4 5-16 cents.

New York banking circles attribute the recent decline in the value of the Canadian dollar to "hardening" of the U.S. dollar. American investors are switching from Canadian to American securities and exchanging the Canadian money they receive from sale of Canadian stocks and bonds for U.S. C.V. BANKING SOURCES REPER currency, banking sources report.

McCarthy Asks UN Support

WASHINGTON — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) fired another blast at America's allies today with a proposal aimed at making them take over more of the costs of the Korean war.

The Wisconsin senator said he has instructed his staff to draft an amendment, to the pending bill, designed to pare the proposed 30-million dollar American share of operating United Nations agencies.

As explained by McCarthy, who is engaged in a transatlantic word battle with British leaders, the amendment would:

1. Reduce the U.S. contribution for U.N. operating expenses to the percentage level of other nations' participation in Korean war financing, and
2. Thereby induce other nations contributing enough to the Korean war effort, to step up their support of regular U.N. activities as a sort of offset.

"We have been contributing 95 per cent of the money and men for the Korean war," McCarthy said in an interview. "If we cut our U.N. contributions to the 1 per cent the other nations have been putting up in Korea, maybe we can get a little more financial cooperation out of them."

Army Buys Up Surplus Butter

WASHINGTON — The Army has picked up a bargain in butter—one million pounds at 15 cents a pound.

It is part of the 190 million pounds the government bought to support prices. The Agriculture department announced the sale to the Army yesterday, and said the service had agreed to buy up to 50 million pounds during the next 16 months if needs develop.

The butter was sold at about the price the Army pays for margarine. The Agriculture Department and other spreads, but not to displace regular military buying of butter.

The department has also donated 74 million pounds to the non-profit school lunch program.

The butter was bought originally for about 67 cents a pound.

SEEK ASYLUM

BERLIN — More than 17,000 Soviet Zone refugees asked for asylum in West Berlin during the first half of May. West Berlin city officials said Saturday. During the same period 19,538 refugees, including previous arrivals, were flown to West Germany in allied commercial planes.
