Lighted tapers in floor candelabra and large arrangements of white pompon chrysanthemums, carnations and pink gladioli were used for decorations.

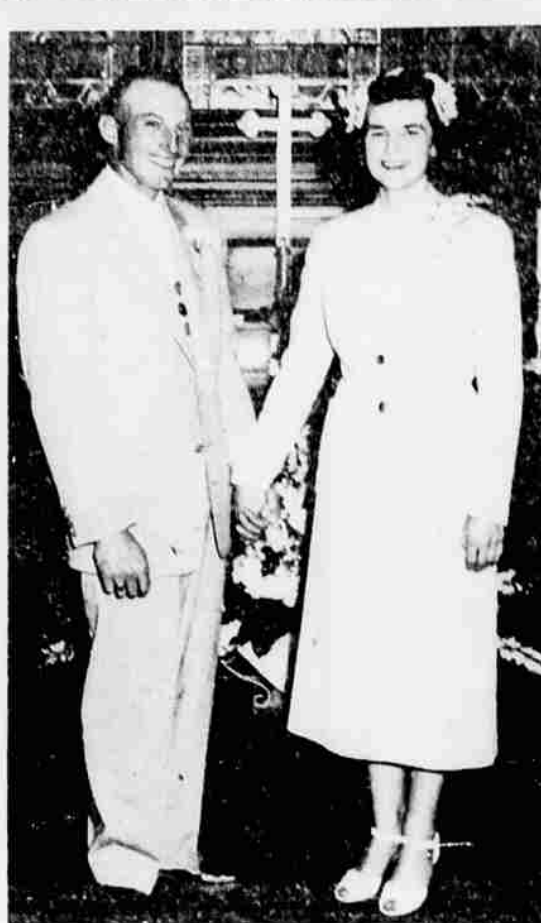
