

Manpower Survey Shows Lack of Engineers in US, College Training Lagging

WASHINGTON — Fewer than 10,000 Americans are trained for college education in the National Manpower Survey today, and for each of the 10,000, there are 100 more who could.

The survey, which is being conducted by the National Manpower Council, a group of scientists, engineers, and other professionals, has found that the country is short of trained manpower in many fields.

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manpower, including:

1. Creation of a presidential commission "to review the impact of governmental contracts upon colleges and universities."
2. Increased financial support for colleges and universities by state and local governments, alumni, business, labor "and other interested groups."
3. Continued public support of "the present program of deferring qualified students in order to enable them to complete their education before they discharge their obligation to military service."
4. A presidential order to "remove dependency, except in cases of hardship, as a ground for deferment in order to insure that postponement of service does not turn into exemption."
5. A directive that the various armed forces "provide sufficient flexibility in their policies governing the calling to active duty of students enrolled in Reserve Officers' Training Corps programs so that well-qualified students are permitted to pursue graduate work prior to their military service."

Storm Warnings Up Along Coast

SEATTLE (AP) — Southeast storm warnings went up Monday noon along the coast from Tatoosh to Cape Blanco, Ore.

The U.S. Weather Bureau forecast southeasterly winds of 25 to 40 miles an hour during the afternoon, with a shift to southwesterly Monday evening. They are expected to subside to 20 to 30 miles an hour during the night and Tuesday.

RFC To Streamline Field Offices

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reconstruction Finance Corporation announced Monday it is reorganizing its field offices to increase efficiency, concentrate agency functions and reduce operating costs.

RFC Administrator Kenton R. Graven said the reorganization will not close any RFC loan offices but reduce 20 district offices to branches of regional agencies.

Regional offices with branch offices under the reorganization will include:

Seattle—Anchorage, Alaska; Helena, Mont.; Portland, Ore.; Spokane, Wash.

Eight other district offices were converted into regional agencies, and six offices now operating as agency branches will report directly to regional agencies.

William B. Minton, 45, a sawmill operator from Philomath, died in a hospital from injuries suffered in a two-car collision near Woodland, Calif., Saturday.

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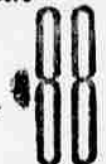
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
