EVERETT (AP) — O. L. Albery, Gold Bar chiropractor, pleaded guilty Wednesday to manslaughter in connection with the death of a diabetic patient and was sentenced to a maximum of 20 years in the state penitentiary.

Superior Judge Edward M. Nollmeyer suspended the sentence because of Albery's health and placed him on probation for three years.

Albery was charged in the death of Mrs. Marjorie Westbrook, 20, of Albany, Ore., a diabetic, May 14, 1951.

Prosecutor Phil Sheridan accused Albery of advising Mrs. Westbrook to reduce the amount of insulin she had been taking.

Albery also was fined \$200 on a charge of practicing chiropractics without a license. As a condition of his probation, he must refrain from the practice of chiropractics.

French Bust 18th Post-War Cabinet

PARIS (AP) — The French National Assembly denied Premier Rene Mayer a vote of confidence Thursday and his cabinet—the 18th since liberation—collapsed.

The purpose of the session, he said, would be to check up on the feasibility of a big four conference. Presumably, his successor will attend.

The unfavorable vote by the Assembly was on Mayer's request for power to cut governmental expenses by cabinet decree, without Assembly approval in each case. He had hoped by this means to cut the country's mountainous budget deficit.
