Electrical Surcharge Off

SALEM (AP) — All electric surcharges in Oregon will end at the end of May, Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Helzel announced Thursday.

Helzel notified the Portland General Electric and Pacific Power and Light Companies Thursday that they must stop the surcharges at the end of the May billing cycle, because by that time, they will have recovered "a substantial portion of all the excess costs."

Helzel will hold a hearing June 3 on a complaint by Rep. Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie, who contends the surcharges are improper.

McKay Out In Power Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Power Commission announced Wednesday it is permitting Secretary of the Interior McKay to withdraw as an intervenor in a pending hearing on the Idaho Power Co.'s application to construct a hydroelectric dam at Oxbow on the Snake River.

The intervention was initiated by McKay's predecessor, Oscar Chapman, who contended construction of the dam would block the proposed Hells Canyon dam project.

McKay disclosed plans May 5 to withdraw Interior Department opposition to granting the Idaho company a license. He said the FPC holds the licensing responsibility and was "clearly charged with considering the matter of full and reasonable development of the resources involved."

Bonneville Dam Inadequate

OLYMPIA (AP) — A Washington Water Power official said Thursday that private utilities cannot depend on the Bonneville Administration for a power supply.

"We must build our own supply," Marshall Blair, WWP superintendent of plant operations, declared. Blair's statement came in testimony before the State Public Service Commission on the proposed merger of WWP with Puget Sound Power and Light Co.

Hard Money Slows Defense

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most of a 240,000-ton expansion of the aluminum industry, launched last fall as a defense move, Thursday reportedly had run around on the government's hard money policy.

Britons Send Aide To Suez

LONDON (AP) — Britain Thursday switched a trouble-shooting diplomat from his post in an Iron Curtain country to Egypt, where British-Egyptian relations have worsened.

The Foreign Office announced that Robert Hankey, minister to Hungary, had been ordered to fly country to Cairo next week to take over from Ambassador Sir Ralph Stevenson, who is returning home on sick leave. Stevenson is suffering from sciatica.

Britain and Egypt have been unable to reach agreement on Egyptian demands for evacuation of British troops from the strategic Suez Canal Zone. Egypt has refused to accept a British proposal to remove the troops but to leave a group of technicians behind to help safeguard the installations.

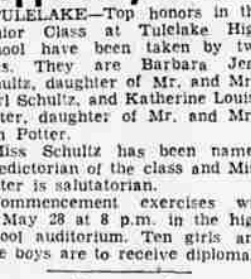
Idaho Power Permit Asked

SALEM (AP) — The Idaho Power Company filed two applications with the Oregon Hydroelectric Commission Wednesday to use waters of the Snake River for hydroelectric development.

The applications are similar to those filed earlier this week with the Federal Power Commission. One application, called the Hells Canyon Development, would use 21,000 cubic feet of water to develop 495,364 theoretical horsepower. The installed capacity would be 372,000 kilowatts, with a peaking capability of 312,600 kilowatts.

Solon Asks Bulb Quota

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Tolleson (R-Wash.) has asked the House Ways and Means Committee to include an import quota on foreign bulbs when it drafts reciprocal trade legislation.

He testified on behalf of the Northwest Bulb Growers Association, whose Oregon and Washington members are the largest producers of daffodil, iris and tulip bulbs in the United States.

Tolleson, who said his district alone grows more King Alfred daffodils than all of Holland — the country from which they came — said growers of the two states "are faced with ruin and bankruptcy" because of the foreign import "dumped on American markets at prices below the cost of production in the United States."

MIG Pilot Under Wraps

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — The second Polish jet pilot to bring his Russian-built MIG-15 fighter down on the Danish Baltic island of Bornholm was brought to Copenhagen Thursday under a cloak-and-dagger security precautions.

The government moved with extreme caution in handling the pilot Lt. Zdzislaw Jawzanski. Immediately upon his arrival in the capital by the regular ferry from the island, he was whisked off to police headquarters for questioning on the purpose of his flight from his Communist homeland.

The 22-year-old pilot, who crash-landed on a military drilling field Wednesday, was preceded 11 weeks ago by Lt. Franciszek Jarecki. The latter was granted political asylum in the United States.

Dr. Kelles Krausz, Polish minister to Denmark called Wednesday night at the foreign ministry and requested quick return of the escape plane, which had its undercarriage smashed and a wing clipped in the rough landing.
