

Grandma's Cold Remedy Proves Best In Test As Miracle Drugs Take Defeat

CHICAGO (AP)—Two doctors who put grandma's cold remedy—bed and rest and liquids—against the modern sulfa and antibiotic drugs reported Wednesday the old treatment actually is better for fighting a cold.

Drs. Howard S. Traisman and L. Martin Hardy of Chicago based this conclusion on a study of 159

patients at Children's Memorial Hospital.

In a report to the 113th annual meeting of the Illinois State Medical Society, they said they divided the patients into groups. One group received bed rest, fluids and aspirin, if needed. Another group received the same treatment plus a sulfa drug. The others received the same treatment plus an antibiotic.

All patients had the usual cold symptoms, fever of about 101 for about two days.

Of the group receiving the old treatment, 25 per cent recovered in one week, 34 per cent in two weeks and the remaining 10 per cent took longer.

Of the drug treated groups taken together, only 39 per cent recovered in one week, 48 per cent in two weeks and 13 per cent took more than two weeks.

The group on the old treatment had slightly more complications—16.3 per cent compared with 12.3 for the sulfa-antibiotic group.

Jurist Sees America On Downgrade

WASHINGTON (AP)—Justice Douglas of the Supreme Court said Wednesday America had lost its commanding position of moral leadership.

"America, seen from abroad, seems alarmed, confused, and intolerant," the jurist said at a meeting of the American Law Institute.

"There are many reasons for that view, Douglas went on.

"One important cause," he said, "is a growing tendency in the interest of security to take short cuts, to disregard the rights of the individual, to sponsor the cause of intolerance, and to adopt more and more the tactics of the world forces we oppose.

"These practices and attitudes may go unnoticed here; but they make headlines in Asia. They are a powerful voice of America, more

powerful indeed than any program we can produce for radio broadcast. They have helped lose for America the commanding position of moral leadership which we had at the end of World War II."

Criticizing trial procedures which he said are sometimes used in this country, the jurist declared:

"We have today no exact parallel of the treason trial of Sir

Walter Raleigh, no exact counterpart of the witch trials of the Massachusetts colony.

"But we have trials and investigations which perpetuate some of the evils of Raleigh's trial and of the witch trials. . . . What greater inroad on liberty can there be than an official condemnation of a man without due process of law?"

Western Bank Savings Gain

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Far Westerners again are stacking collars to new heights in savings accounts after a lapse of several weeks.

These accounts—called time deposits in bank reports—reached the unprecedented peak of 6,433 million dollars in Federal Reserve member banks in the seven leading cities of the 12th district for the week ended May 13. The accounts are for individuals, partnerships and corporations.

The weekly report, issued by the San Francisco Federal Reserve Bank, placed the district total at \$98 million dollars higher than a year earlier.
