## 'Boys Town of West' Has Big Plans, Judge's Eye

WHITE SALMON, Wash. (AP) — A retired British Army officer has established a "problem boys" camp on an 80-acre farm near here, but the project has run into court and neighborhood complications.

While the operator, Maj. F. H. Blake, has expressed his interest in maintaining a constructive social project, there have been complaints about the operation from both residents of the area and the county judge.

Neighborhood complaints were heard at a recent Superior Court hearing.

Afterward, Judge J. E. Stone went to Camp Columbia and served notice on the operator and boys that there must be improvement in conditions at the camp, in the boys' conduct and in their attendance at the nearby public school.

The alternative, he warned, might be the possibility of sending the boys to the state training school.

Judge Stone says he still has the camp under judicial review. He lauds the idea of the project as commendable, but he is not at all sure it will work out.

But Major Blake has high hopes and long range plans.

The first new building—the result of labor and material donated by citizens and by labor and fraternal groups of Oregon and Washington—will be dedicated in June.

The purpose of the camp, Maj. Blake explained, is to provide a home and guidance for boys who because there is no other place to send them—would otherwise be sent to detention schools or the state reformatory. Eventually, the

major said, he plans to send every boy to college or teach him a trade.

Only a few of the 31 boys now living at the camp have been classified as delinquent, the major explained. The rest are homeless or abandoned by their parents. Ages range from 8 to 18.

The new building will house a dormitory, kitchen, dining hall, recreation room, school and chapel. It will be named the Capwell house in honor of a former Fort Lewis soldier, Sgt. Jerry Capwell.

Sgt. Capwell was one of three soldiers sent to the camp by the commander of Fort Lewis to help with repairs during the camp's early days. He was one of the first to be sent overseas at the Korean outbreak. Because he had no family, he made Camp Columbia beneficiary of his GI insurance.

Soon after, Sgt. Capwell was killed in action.

Blake said that as more funds become available the camp will be expanded. He said it will be patterned after Father Flanagan's Boys Town in Nebraska. As such, it will be a community in itself with a store, movie, soda fountain, barber shop, gymnasium and school.

The camp will be open to all regardless of race, color or creed, the major said. He said it will differ from Father Flanagan's Boys Town only in that it will be non-sectarian with Protestant leadership.

Camp Columbia has been and will continue to be supported entirely by public contributions, Blake said.

"We do not accept state aid because by doing so we would be subject to state regulation," he said. "In that case we would become just another state institution with the usual regulations and fences."

Major Blake said he has received applications from nearly every state in the West, and he has had to refuse more than 20 boys because of space limitations.

An administrative board and an advisory council, composed of 20 business and professional men of Washington and Oregon, rules on camp policy and finances.

## Hollywood Star Complains Of Too Much Publicity

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Today Dale Robertson comes up with a starter—he thinks he has been getting too much publicity.

Most movie stars moan that they're not getting enough space in the public prints. Not Oklahoma Dale.

"Toward the end of 1952, I figured I had done 137 picture layouts during the year," he remarked. "I decided that was enough and told people I didn't want to do any more for a while."

That might seem like a reasonable request, but it touched off a running feud with certain members of the press. In his cool, calculated manner, Dale is hopping mad about the whole thing.

"I think it's just as bad to get too much publicity as it is to get the wrong kind," he declared. "An actor can burn himself out by having his name and face seen too much. Some press people don't care about that."

"They go on writing about an actor. When his success has faded, they'll have other actors to write about. But what about that actor? He has only one chance at success. After that passes him by, what is left for him? Nothing. That's why I want my film career to last as long as possible."

He said that some reporters couldn't see it his way. He cited certain "fantasies" such as the report he had a fight with his stand-in at the latter's wedding in Las Vegas.

"We've never had as much as a cross word between us," Dale vowed. His stand-in confirmed this.

"Then came the Rita Hayworth thing," the actor continued. "She had been turning down publicity too, so people thought it would be a good idea to link us together. We were reported dating. I've never met the woman; I haven't even seen her on the street."

"What do you suppose the fans think when they read things like that? They know I'm a married man. I say no one has a right to print such things. An actor depends on the public's good will. When something is printed to endanger that good will, his job is being jeopardized."

Dale subscribes to the Humphrey Bogart theory: All you owe the public is a good performance.

"I'll add that I think I'm obligated to conduct my life in a respectable manner," he said. "Young people especially are impressionable and will emulate the behavior of their favorites."

"But otherwise I don't hold to the notion that the public has the right to know everything about an actor's life. Yes, I know that we live on the public's good will. But so does any other worker. So does the butcher, the garage mechanic,

the dentist. But nobody insists on knowing all about their private life. I didn't want to be a worn-out name before I got a good role. When I finally got my first break, I had an offer from every studio in town.

"I had an offer from MGM for more money than at Fox. But I chose Fox because they had fewer actors of my type. I knew I could get ahead faster."
