Brooklyn Bridge, Still Unpurchased, To Mark 70th Birthday Date On Sunday

NEW YORK (U.S.)—The Brooklyn Bridge will be 70 years old Sunday, and maybe it's time to kill a few ugly rumors which have plagued the old lady since her days as the glamor queen of suspension bridges.

First off, there is no evidence to support the notion that the Brooklyn Bridge ever was party to a confidence game.

Old-timers in the city Department of Public Works, in the Police Department and district attorney's office can't recall a single instance of record where anybody actually tried to sell the bridge to a sucker. Nobody seems to know how the rumor got started in the first place.

It took \$15,500,000 and more than 13 years to build the bridge. At today's prices, according to J. Frank Johnson, director of the Division of Bridges, its replacement would cost about \$75,000,000.

When it was opened with fireworks and oratory in 1883, the bridge was the longest suspension span in the world, stretching 1,595 feet across the East River. It held that title for 20 years. Today it ranks ninth among suspension bridges, but for beauty of line and proportion many experts claim that its granite and steel grandeur still is second to none. Also, it still is said to rank first in personal publicity. No bridge ever had more written about it or more pictures painted of it.

Even so, the bridge today would be a poor buy at almost any price. The cruel truth about the Brooklyn Bridge is that it earns no money. It has been many years since it did.

In the old days, it cost pedestrians a penny to walk across. Sheep and hogs were charged two cents each and a one-horse wagon paid 10 cents. (A second horse raised the tariff to 20 cents). But tolls were cut out a long time ago. Today, no animals or trucks or trains cross the bridge. Only cars and pedestrians, for free.

Now about Steve Brodie, that Fourth Ward newsboy who was supposed to have jumped on July 23, 1886. Early that afternoon a man—or something—was seen to plunge off the bridge. A few seconds later, Brodie was hauled out of the river by friends in a rowboat. It has always remained a moot question whether Brodie actually jumped or simply dropped into the river from a boat and waited for a dummy to fall in.

Right now, the Brooklyn Bridge is a one-way affair because of

Alumina Plant Set At Dalles

WASHINGTON (U.S.) — The Harvey Machine Company, Inc., of Torrance, Calif., and the government have signed an agreement under which the company will construct an aluminum production plant at The Dalles, Ore., with an annual capacity of 54,000 short tons.

The General Services Administration represented the government in the deal, first in the third round of aluminum expansion under the defense mobilization program.

The company, not now engaged in production of primary aluminum, agreed to start construction by June 24 of a two-polline aluminum reduction plant and an alumina plant with capacity to fully supply the reduction operation. Construction is to be completed by May 1, 1955.
