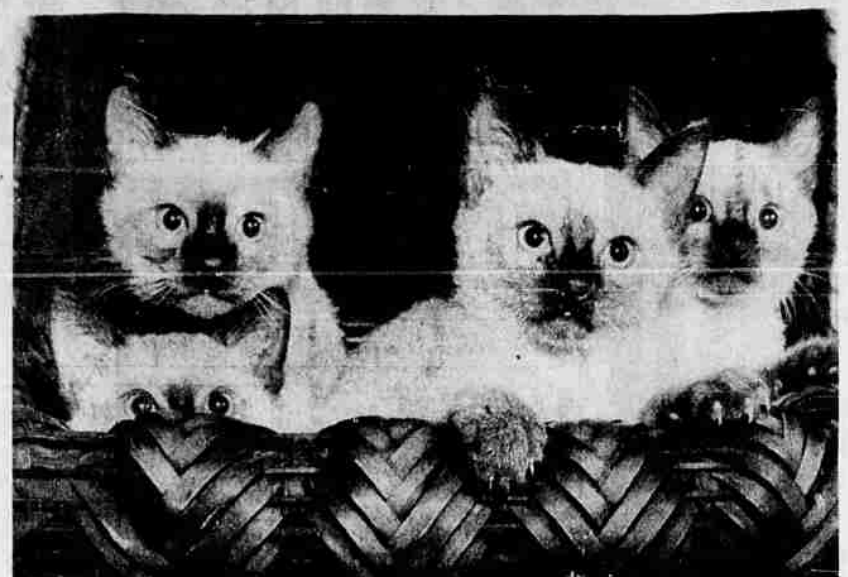

CHICAGO (AP) — Hog prices declined this week after reaching a 32-month peak last week end. The week's supply was comparatively small — about 3,000 — and wholesale pork prices rose generally \$1.00 — \$1.00. Barrows and gilts brought 44-65 cents less than a week ago. Sows were down 25-75 cents. Receipts were comprised largely of new crop butchers weighing under 270 lbs. The week's top price was \$25.25 paid for one lot of choice No. 1 lightweights.

Cattle receipts were slightly smaller than a week ago, though 34 per cent greater than the same week in 1952. Fed steers and yearlings continued to predominate slaughter steers and yearlings were unevenly steady to 75 cents higher, heifers steady to 50 cents higher, cows and bulls steady to weak and vealers \$2.00 lower.

The highest price paid so far in May was \$25.25 for low loads of 1,240 lb. Nebraska fed steers.
