Name Ships Toting Reds, Mundt Asks

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Mundt (R-SD) said today he will demand that the Eisenhower administration take off the "blinders on ourselves" and reveal the names of British ships alleged to have transported Chinese Communist troops.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.) promptly announced he will back Mundt's move to demand cancellation of an order making the ship names an official secret.

Both are members of the Senate investigations subcommittee which heard testimony Wednesday that two or more British-owned ships were used as troop transports along the China coast and may still be so used.

The subcommittee, which has announced sending a demand to Eisenhower that he state publicly what he thinks of this, said last night such a demand was never sent and may never be.

Francis D. Flanagan, subcommittee chief counsel confirmed reports that the letter had been withheld on orders from Chairman McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Flanagan, when told that word had leaked out that the White House letter was being withheld, said: "Sen. McCarthy wants to discuss it further with the subcommittee."

McCarthy dictated the letter Wednesday shortly before he entered the Navy Medical Center at Bethesda, Md., for a checkup.

In testimony Wednesday, the Wheelock Marden Company of Hong Kong was mentioned as operator of at least one ship which allegedly carried Red China troops. The company has denied the charge and the British government has called for a transcript of the testimony.

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) lashed out at Britain as "the villain in the piece" in Red China trade during a Maritime Day address at Los Angeles yesterday.

"Ships of foreign nations which we consider allies today seem more eager to trade with our Communist enemies than to trade with us," Magnuson said.

In London, a Foreign Office representative remarked it was difficult "to comment on a report that unidentified ships of unknown tonnage carried unspecified numbers of so-called troops at a date not known between unstated ports."

The British Information Service in Washington also said it was impossible to answer "allegations as vague as this."

OBERAMMERGAU, Germany (AP)—Uncle Sam is teaching some of the secrets of atomic warfare to his NATO allies here in one of the world's most peaceful spots.

Retail Trade Up Despite Tax Threats

NEW YORK (AP)—Business took in stride this week news of its federal tax prospects.

Except for a strike-imposed cut-back in automobile production, industrial output swung along at its near-record pace.

Retail volume picked up, except in some durable goods.

But tax proposals held the spotlight. Most pertinent of these were: President Eisenhower's recommendations for six-month extension of the excess profits tax—

anathema to many business leaders—and for indefinite postponement of the scheduled drop in corporate income taxes next April 1.

Business men long have contended the excess profits tax stifles profit incentives. Nor are they happy about the 52 per cent tax rate on corporation income.

The Treasury disclosed a federal sales tax is being considered as part of the general tax law overhaul. Such organizations as the National Association of Manufacturers have advocated this type of tax.

Although much attention centered on auto industry shutdowns affecting upwards of 135,000 workers, even here comparisons with a year ago were favorable.

Car and truck assemblies in U.S. and Canadian plants this week were estimated by Ward's reports at 162,110 units, a drop of more than 15,000 from the previous week but well above 127,759 in the similar 1952 week.

There were many other factors supporting the optimistic view of near-term business.

Price trends in basic materials were firm. Lead advanced half a cent a pound, and there was increased talk of generally higher prices for gasoline and residual fuel oil and of the strong probability of a rise in basic steel prices.
