

'Cadillac Crusade': Morse Term For Bond Rate Hike

OMAHA (AP) — Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon continued his bitter denunciation of the Eisenhower administration over the week end.

Speaker at a dinner sponsored by the Omaha Americans for Democratic Action Saturday night, Morse said that increasing interest rates on government bonds to 3 1/2 per cent was a "Cadillac crusade" and a "multi-million dollar gift to

the bankers of the country" that has "mortgaged America for 30 years."

He said the "political cynicism of the administration is almost unparalleled in our history," and that the administration "does not seem to understand that enlightened capitalism does not mean the right of big business to exploit the economically weak."

The dinner was a memorial to the late Sen. George W. Norris of Nebraska. Like Morse, Norris started as a Republican but later became an Independent.

Morse said he thinks that between the two major parties in the U. S., the greatest hope for liberalism is with the Democrats.

On Sunday Morse, appearing on the radio-television show, Meet Your Congress, repeated his suggestion that the Korean problem be referred to a five-man court composed of two Americans, two Russians and a neutral, "such as Sweden," for solution.

Meanwhile, in Washington, he was one of eight new members elected to the national board of ADA.

Portland Cost Of Living Up

PORTLAND (AP) — Living costs in Portland last month were nearly double what they were in the 1933-1939 period, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Saturday.

Last month's living cost index was 115.4, based on the 1947-49 period. That is an increase of six-tenths of a point over the April, 1952, period and 13 1/2 per cent above April, 1950. Using 1935 to 1939 as the base, last month's index would be 199.9.

Increases in the cost of housing, transportation and cigarettes and food were blamed for last month's rise. Other items increasing in price during the first quarter of the year were gasoline, fuel oil and wood, electric stoves and vacuum cleaners, dry cleaning, laundry services and doctors' fees.

The price of clothing dropped three-tenths of a per cent.

The national index was 113.7, or 1.7 lower than Portland's.

Austria Peace Hopes Dim

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department, almost on the eve of new Austrian treaty talks with Russia, said Monday Moscow's attitude "leaves little hope for a satisfactory conclusion of a treaty in the immediate future."

A lengthy review of Austrian treaty negotiations, made public Monday, placed the blame for failure to agree to an Austrian peace settlement squarely on Russia.

It accused Russia of "broken pledges," stalling and refusing to accept an Austrian pact because of its desire to "exploit" Austria's economy.

2 By-the-drink Permits Issued

Two more basin establishments got the "go ahead" Monday to Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

Fifteen liquor vendors in the Basin area are now operating under the new state regulation which permits bars for the first time in 37 years to sell liquor by the glass.

The latest permits were issued to VFW Pelican Post 1383, 315 Klamath Ave., and the 97 Supper Club, junction of the Weed-Klamath Highway.

SALEM TOWER DROPPED

WASHINGTON (AP) — The airport control tower at Salem, Ore., is one of 18 throughout the U. S. which is being discontinued July 1, the Civil Aeronautics Administration reported Saturday.

The towers are being closed for economy reasons, the CAA reported.
