TULELAKE—Charles Rose, well-known public accountant here for 10 years, died in the Veteran's Hospital at Camp White, Sunday. He had been ill for several years and had been a patient in various hospitals for the past three years.

He was a veteran of World Wars I and II and served in World War I in both Europe and Australia. He was a member and past commander of Tulelake Post No. 164, American Legion.

The body is to be shipped to New York where he has three brothers. Rose had no relatives here.

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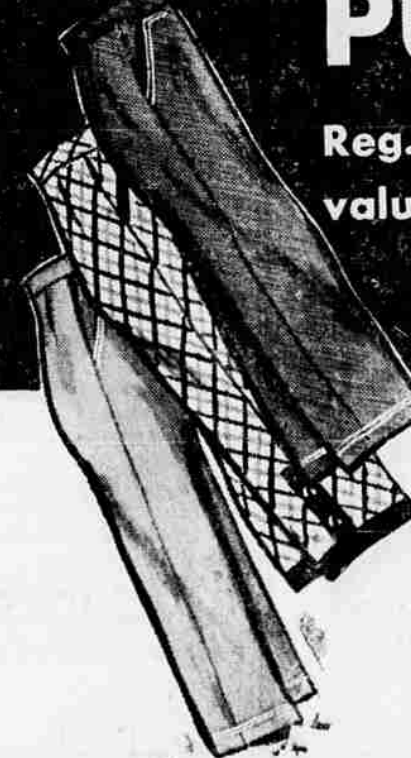
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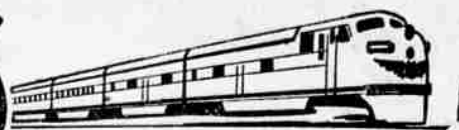
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
