CHICAGO (AP) — Grains made a rather halting advance on the Board of Trade Tuesday following overnight announcement of a government "release" program for 1952 crop wheat stored on farms.
The upturn never got back all the ground lost in the previous week session. Also, the market tended to drift lower after the half way point as buying power ran out.
Wheat closed 1-1/4 higher, July \$2.10 1/2-3/4, corn unchanged to 3/4, higher, July \$1.56 1/4-1/2, oats 1/4-1/2 higher, July 70 1/2-1/4, rye 3/4 lower to 1/4 higher, July \$1.50 1/2-1/4, soybeans 1/2-1/4 higher, July \$2.85 1/4-1/2, and large 10 to 30 cents a hundred pounds lower, July \$10.15-1/2.

CHICAGO (AP) — Hog prices continued their see-saw pattern of recent sessions Tuesday with decline of 25 to 50 cents a hundred pounds.
Cattle also trended lower although lambs held firm.
Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$22.50 to \$24.65, although a few topped at \$24.75 and a few underweights sold off as low as \$21.50. Sows generally made \$19.00 to \$22.50, a few topping out at \$23.00. Good clearance was obtained on the 9,500 hogs on sale, which compared with an expected 8,000.
Young cattle were steady to weak at \$20.75 to \$24.75 on steers on heifers, grades good to prime and yearlings and \$20.00 to \$23.75 in both classes. Cows were steady to 50 cents lower at \$14.50, bulls steady to strong from \$16.50 downward, and weaners weak to \$10.00 lower with only a few prime getting the top of \$26.00.
Good to prime native spring lambs found a wide range from \$26.00 to \$30.00. The best clipped lambs were only choice and brought \$25.00 and below. Ewes still were weak at \$6.00 downward.
Estimated receipts included 8,500 cattle, 500 calves, and 500 sheep.

SALEM (AP) — State Tax Commissioners Ray Smith and Sam Stewart were reappointed Tuesday by the Board of Control to four-year terms beginning June 5.
Gov. Paul L. Patterson and Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry were ready to reappoint them two weeks ago, but action was held up to allow State Treasurer Sig Unander, the third board member, to investigate.
Unander said at Tuesday's board meeting that he favored both reappointments.
Smith heads the income tax division, and Stewart is in charge of property assessment. The third tax commissioner, Carl Chambers, heads utility taxation.

2 Indians Face Arson Charges

PORTLAND (AP) — Two Klamath reservation Indians will go on trial June 25 on a charge of arson. The two, William A. Huff and L. O. Pearson, pleaded innocent Tuesday to the charge that they burned down a Chiloquin residence.
June trial date also was set for Mitchell Queamus, former Chiloquin postmaster, who pleaded innocent to embezzling \$1,800 from the post office.
Two men pleaded guilty to driving stolen cars across state lines. They were Niles E. Hamberg of North Bend, and Clifford W. Case of Tacoma. Pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

No Decision Yet On Grocery Clerks

PORTLAND (AP) — AFL food and drug clerks here voted Tuesday on whether to accept an offer of the city's major grocers. Their negotiating committee recommended that they turn it down.
The clerks have authority to strike the Fred Meyer group of stores. If they do, the other firms in Food Employers, Inc., will send their clerks home, they said last week.

Earl Browder's Son, Never A Red, Gets Fellowship

NEW YORK (AP) — In awarding a fellowship to Dr. Felix Browder, son of former Communist leader Earl Browder, the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation first determined that he is not and never was a Communist, the foundation reported Tuesday.

Dr. Browder, an instructor in mathematics at Boston University, is a registered Democrat.

A statement from the foundation would agree that Dr. Browder, "as an able and loyal young American" was entitled "to have his opportunity for development."

The statement described the 25-year-old Browder as a brilliant mathematician. His fellowship, for mathematical studies at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, N. J., was one of 191 awards announced by the foundation last Sunday.
