'Bwana Devil' Star Admits The 3-D Picture Was Bad

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The star of Hollywood's first 3-D epic admits that the picture was bad.
 "The picture was bad," Stack admitted. "But I did wonder for the movie business, myself included, says dashing Robert Stack, the glamor boy of the society and cinema circuit."
 He was the leading actor in Arch Oboler's "Bwana Devil," the independent film that caused a revolution in the film industry.

 Stack told me these facts before the blast of jet airplanes. He was working at San Fernando Valley Airport on "Sabre Jet," the first air epic about fighter pilots over Korea.
 "The basic story of 'Bwana Devil' sounded okay, so I signed to do the picture," he remarked. The script turned out to be bad. We could only do the best we could.

Ike Ordered To Produce Secret File

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U. S. Court of Claims has ordered President Eisenhower to produce a secret 10-year old report by the Securities and Exchange Commission on the Empire Ordnance Co.
 This was disclosed Wednesday by the White House and by Bartley Crum, New York attorney for the company, a munitions maker.
 Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said at the White House that a subpoena calling on Eisenhower to produce the SEC report was delivered Tuesday. He said it was sent to the Department of Justice and "any comment will have to come from there."
 The Department had no immediate comment.
 The company, a World War II firm specializing in tank guns, is involved in controversies with the government for renegotiation of war-tie contracts and tax refunds.
 Crum termed the court order "not a common thing." He explained that as the executive and judicial branches of the government have equal status under the Constitution, the President is not bound to comply with the order.
 Crum said all the company files had been seized by the government and impounded with the secret report. He said the files and the secret report were sealed by President Roosevelt in 1943. He added President Truman gave the Department of Justice access to them.
 "We thought we should be given the same opportunity to use the report and our own files," Crum said.
 In addition to the company, Frank M. McHale, former Democratic national committeeman from Indiana, is involved in the case.
 Empire Ordnance has filed suit in the Court of Claims to recover a \$935,000 contract award to the company which the government impounded to satisfy tax claims against subsidiaries of the firm.

McCarthy Off On 10-Day Investigative Circuit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) announced today he is leaving the city tomorrow — perhaps the country — on a 10 day tour for his Senate investigations subcommittee. But he declined to say where he is heading, or what he may investigate.
 McCarthy turned over to others the handling of his demands for a government crackdown on friendly nations which continue to trade with Red China.
 He predicted the Navy Department will modify its refusal to name publicly the British-owned ships McCarthy contends have been used to transport Chinese Red troops during the Korean War.
 "The navy has indicated it may declassically the names of these British-owned ships and the firms which own them," McCarthy told reporters.
 He said Sen. Mundt (R-SD), as acting chairman of the subcommittee, "has full authority" to call a public hearing to take the testimony if the Navy agrees.
 The subcommittee already has the information, McCarthy added, but is barred from making it public by Pentagon and State Department rulings that public disclosure might hinder U. S. efforts to curb trade with Communist China.
 McCarthy yesterday called before his subcommittee Aaron Copland, Pulitzer Prize-winning composer and musician, for two hours of closed door questioning in another line of inquiry.
 After the session, Copland issued a statement saying: "I testified under oath that I never have been and am not now a Communist; and that as a composer and free man I have always been and am now opposed to the limitations put on freedom by the Soviet Union."
 He said he had permitted use of his name by some organizations, which he did not identify, "without the knowledge or intention of supporting Communist or Communist front organizations."
 McCarthy said Copland was granted a week "to refresh his recollection" concerning possible membership in certain organizations before being asked to testify again.
 Copland, who won a Pulitzer Prize in music in 1944, made a lecture tour of South America in 1947 as a cultural representative of the State Department. That tour and his work as an adviser to the government on propaganda-information activities brings him within the scope of the subcommittee's inquiry, McCarthy said.

French Quit Concrete Fort

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — French Union troops Wednesday pulled out of Yen Vi, a key post guarding one of the main entrances to the Red River delta. The French said they destroyed the reinforced concrete fort.
 The Yen Vi post was one of hundreds of such concrete forts built up under the command of the late Marshal Jean de Lattre de Tassigny to protect the rice-rich delta, key prize of the Indochina civil war with the Communist-led Vietnam.
 The French had claimed the forts were impregnable. Yen Vi is the first they have given up.
 A French Army spokesman said the evacuation was "not made because of enemy pressure." The withdrawal, he added, was effected without any enemy opposition.
 It appeared possible that the French intended to hold the defense line in the sector on the left bank of the Day River.

Gen. Collins Named To NATO Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Wednesday appointed Gen. J. Lawton Collins to serve on the military committee and the standing group of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
 The appointment becomes effective Aug. 15 when Collins completes his term as Army chief of staff and Gen. Omar N. Bradley retires as chairman of the joint chiefs of staff.

Pea Sale May Be Probed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Shelley (R-Calif.) says he wants an investigation of the sale by the government of 8,500 tons of dried peas at what he said was a discount of \$1,600,000.
 Shelley said a House speech Tuesday the sale was made under circumstances indicating "something more than a straight business deal."
 The Agriculture Department's Production and Marketing Administration announced the sale May 1. Shelley said, without prior notice or seeking of bids. He said the price paid by a combine of purchasers was \$30 a ton, while another Agriculture Department division was selling peas at \$50 a ton.
 The combine, he added, included a firm headed by Carl Farrington, a member of Secretary Benson's advisory committee, who Shelley said is also a cousin of R. L. Farrington, an Agriculture Department official.
