CHICAGO (AP) — Hog prices again reversed their previous day's pattern Wednesday for gains of 25 to 30 cents a hundred pounds in a fairly active market.
Cattle were mostly steady to 50 cents lower but lambs were fully steady on a limited supply.
Most barrows and gilts sold from \$24.00 to \$25.00 but a few loads and lots were worth up to \$25.15. Sows ranged from \$19.50 to \$23.00 with a few topping out as lightweights at \$23.50.
Prime steers and yearlings sold from \$30.50 to \$35.00 and comparable hogs from \$22.00 to \$24.00. Cows topped at \$14.00.
Eastern shippers took native spring lambs at \$27.00 to \$30.00. Good and choice grades sold from \$25.50 to \$26.50.
Estimated salable head totaled 6,500 hogs, 13,000 cattle, 400 calves and 500 sheep.

Wheat fell to a new low point since 1950 and many contracts of other cereals set new seasonal lows in a selling move which got underway around mid-morning and continued through to the close.
Earlier, the market had shown some strength, soybeans particularly forging ahead on short covering in sympathy with a higher soybean oil market.

AFL, CIO Plan Streamlining

WASHINGTON (AP) — Both the AFL and CIO Tuesday announced plans for streamlining their organizing activities to make them more efficient and effective.

Both organizations said they are keeping the same number of organizers and intend to spend as much money as in the past, but are re-vamping their organizing setups to get greater results.

One step inaugurated by the AFL is to require regional directors to submit progress reports every four months to national headquarters, including data on paid membership from each region and each state.

The AFL divided the country into 14 organizing regions, with one for Canada. The CIO consolidated its offices into 13 regions.

These are among the AFL regions and directors in charge: Dan Flanagan — California, Oregon, Washington, and Alaska, headquarters at San Francisco. CIO regional offices and directors include: Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada and Arizona — Headquarters San Francisco, Timothy F. Flynn.

Oregon-American Sale About Sure

LONGVIEW (AP) — Acquisition by the Long-Bell Lumber Co. of the Oregon-American Lumber Co. plant and timber holdings at Vernonia, Ore., was a step nearer Wednesday after Long-Bell officials revealed 95 per cent of the minority common stockholders of Oregon-American had agreed to the plan.

The Long-Bell offer had been made to the Central Coal & Coke Corp., which owns about 64 per cent of the Oregon-American common. The offer was contingent on 90 per cent of the minority interest accepting \$200 a share.
