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New Hardboard Source Found

CORVALLIS (AP)—A new source of raw material for dry-formed hardboards may be provided by Oregon's lodgepole pine forests. Gaylord Nixon, wood technologist at the Oregon Forest Products Laboratory here, says more than

80 per cent of the state's lodgepole stands may be used in manufacturing hardboards. Most of the trees are from six to 10 inches in diameter. Nixon said experiments at the laboratory showed that lodgepole pine chips which had been steamed before grinding produced a fiber which made stronger boards than did the fiber ground from raw, green chips.

A new market for the lodgepole would improve the employment situation in some Eastern Oregon communities which have been worried over the effect of diminishing

California To Be Tougher On Drivers

ALTURAS — Stricter enforcement of traffic laws in California was announced here Wednesday by Highway Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell.

The commissioner said that in future no driver warnings will be issued when violations of safety rules are evident.

"From now on, there will be no borderline cases," he explained. "If an unsafe driving practice involves a violation and most of them do, a citation will be issued."

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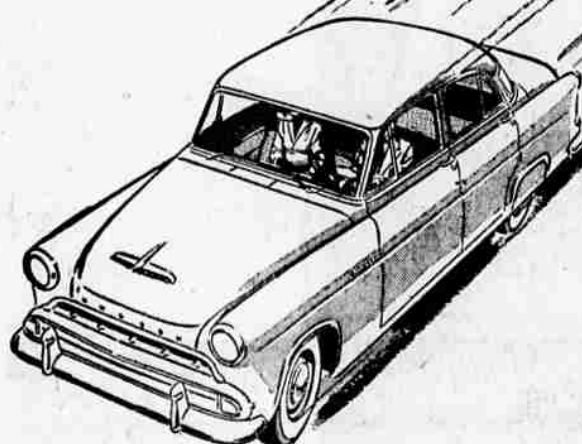
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
