Gulliver was quite a traveler but he had nothing on Frederick Clifton Lawrence.

For years before settling in Klamath Falls in 1930, Lawrence scampers about the North American continent almost constantly as a professional photographer shooting pictures for national magazines.

His file of endeavor ranged from snapping glaciers in Alaska to making art studies of native life in Mexico. During World War II, he was a civilian photographer for the Coast Guard. His chief assignment at that time was photographing battle damaged vessels towed into New York Harbor.

While on duty in New York Harbor, Lawrence became a target for Dan Cupid. He met his wife, Wyn, aboard the HMS Sheffield during a reception. Lawrence was taking pictures and his bride-to-be was acting in her capacity as an employee of the British Consul.

After a speedy courtship, the nuptials took place at Old Forge, N. Y., a historic battlefield of the Revolutionary War.

"We met on a battleship and were married on a battlefield," the erstwhile cameraman declared.

"But we haven't had a single battle." In 1949, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence decided to take the advice of Horace Greeley and go west. How they came to make their home in Klamath Falls is a story in itself. Mrs. Lawrence tells it this way:

"We wrote to chambers of commerce in 26 cities in Pacific Coast states. We also subscribed to newspapers in those cities. We were most impressed by the letter we received from the Klamath Falls Chamber of Commerce and what we read in The Herald and News. So we left New York and drove directly here."

Since coming to this city, Lawrence has given up professional photography. He is now manager of Allstate Automobile Insurance Co., a subsidiary of Sears Roebuck and Co.

"We have been very happy in Klamath Falls," Lawrence said. "We have never regretted our

choice of it as a city in which to establish a permanent home." Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence reside at 614 Conger Ave.

Russia Seen Resuming Hate-America Campaign

Moscow suddenly has changed its tone, and a new "hate America" campaign seems in the offing.

The Kremlin charge of American spy activities in the Soviet Ukraine indicates the new campaign will be dictated largely by internal conditions. The post-Stalin regime of Georgi M. Malenkov evidently still has a struggle on its hands and cannot afford to extend its brief era of sweetness and light.

The mask of reasonableness appeared to have dropped away abruptly last weekend with Pravda's blast against the projected Bermuda conference of the Big Three. On top of this came the Kremlin's rejection of four-power talks on an Austrian treaty of independence. The chips were down on a test of Moscow's sweet talk.

The new spy charges put out by the Kremlin follow precisely and almost in every detail the pattern of the charges against the United States in December, 1951, when the Americans were accused of parachuting spies into Soviet Moldavia. Like the Ukraine, Moldavia has been a source of trouble to the Kremlin, a constant target of press abuse because of outcroppings of "bourgeois nationalism."

Those charges were followed up by a formal Moscow protest to Washington that the United States was encouraging subversive activities inside Soviet and "peoples democracy" territory. A similar protest may be expected this time.

After the Malenkov regime took over, the Soviet press soft-pedaled such charges against the United States. The Americans' Mutual

Security Act, which the Russians charge is designed to promote subversion within their borders, was not mentioned. It had figured prominently in the Soviet press in the previous all-out hate-America campaign in which the Moldavian spy charges—indignantly rejected by the U. S. State Department—played a large part.

Stories of the capture and execution of "spies" for the United States apparently make a deep impression on the Soviet people, furthering the idea that they are surrounded by enemies intent upon their destruction. This propaganda campaign now apparently will be resumed. There seems to be one good reason behind it: the need for a menacing outside enemy to persuade the Soviet people to close ranks and to provide the excuse for harsh measures against any evidences of nationalism or of restiveness of Soviet peoples under the domination of the Great Russians.

The Soviet press has reverted to the old Great Russian chauvinism in a form fully as outrageous

as that of the days immediately following World War II.

With this propaganda, Western observers gained the impression that the Communist hierarchy in the Kremlin felt itself insecure, was afraid of elements within the Soviet Army and Navy. While throwing frequent sops to the military, the Kremlin was constantly seeking ways and means for keeping the Army and Navy under

strict party control. The new Communist party statutes, dictated last October by Malenkov, make it clear that the Army is subordinate to the party. The statutes also stress heavily that it is the duty of every Soviet citizen to spy upon his neighbor and inform the authorities of any suspicious acts.

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No Irrigation For Rogue Area

GRANTS PASS (AP) — The high water that washed out the cofferdam at Savage Rapids Dam Tuesday will leave this section of the Rogue River Valley without irrigation for three or four weeks.

If heavy rains should resume, the delay could be even longer, for the river flow must drop before the cofferdam can be rebuilt.

Harry Clark, county agricultural agent, said crops could get by for two weeks after rains stop. He said dairies might suffer the most, since they may be forced to buy hay from Eastern Oregon. Some lup and bulb growers also may suffer, he said.

The loss of the cofferdam will be borne by the construction company, Young & Smith, Salt Lake City, which was rehabilitating the dam when the high water struck.

The loss was estimated at \$30,000 by Charles Miller, manager of the Grants Pass Irrigation District.

The owners previously said they would have to close unless the Fire Department would change its decision. The owners said the changes would cost too much.
