Woolson, Last GAR Vet, Does His Stuff Tomorrow

DULUTH, Minn. (AP)—Albert Henry Woolson has his blue serge suit with brass buttons cleaned and pressed and the "GAR" on his uniform cap sparkles.

Saturday is the old soldier's 84th Memorial Day and the 106-year-old Civil War veteran will be the center of Duluth's observance of the day.

A busy schedule has been set for Woolson, who Saturday—for the first time—will note Memorial Day without a single comrade in the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR). The organization once counted 408,489 members.

Named Vice Commander in Chief of the GAR at its last session, Woolson is the only survivor of the 2,675,000-man Union Army in the Civil War. James A. Hard, Rochester, N. Y., the only other Northern veteran, died March 12.

Memorial Day was first officially observed in 1869 on the order of Gen. John A. Logan, GAR commander.

Woolson's self-designed GAR uniform came back from the cleaners Thursday.

He will put it on and at 9 a. m. Saturday will lay a wreath on the soldiers' and sailors' monument in front of the Duluth Courthouse. A half hour later, he will get into a convertible and assume his post as honorary grand marshal of a parade down Duluth's main thoroughfare, Superior Street.

A native of Watertown, N. Y., Woolson was a drummer boy in the Civil War, enlisting when he was 17 in the first Minnesota Artillery Regiment. He spent less than a year in the Union blue, serving the entire time on garrison duty in Chattanooga, Tenn.

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Classed as Bandits, Reds, Colombians Protestants Say

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)—The evangelical confederation of Colombia says the Roman Catholic Church and pro-government press have intensified a "malicious campaign" here to "place Protestantism in the same category as Communism and revolutionary banditry."

A periodic report by the Protestant organization Thursday night cited 17 alleged incidents of persecution of Protestants in the period of March 1, April 30.

According to the report, a church and missionary residence in Atanquez, Magdalena, was damaged by continual stoning, and in Bucaramanga authorities reportedly arrested an Adventist for removing a picture of President Robert Urdaneta Arbelaez from the door of a Protestant church. It was charged the arrested man was beaten, forced to eat a picture of the president and given the "water treatment."

In other cases, Protestants allegedly were arrested, threatened and intimidated. Several Americans were reported to have been involved. The report said:

A bullet struck near American missionary Rev. Frank H. Hornung of Seattle, Wash., during services in Barrancabermeja, Santander. In the same town, Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Knapp of Portland, Ore., received a threatening letter, allegedly signed by Catholics in the town.

Church Slates Guest Pastors

The Rev. David Barnett Jr., First Presbyterian Church, is in Minneapolis as commissioner of the Southwest Oregon Presbytery at the General Assembly. The assembly is to continue until June 3 when Barnett will take half his annual vacation.

He is to return to his pulpit here June 28. He will leave again in mid-July for the National Boy Scout Jamboree at Irvine Ranch, Calif., where he will be sectional chaplain for some 1,200 boys.

During the last half of August, Barnett will take the remaining half of his vacation.

During his absence the First Presbyterian pulpit will be filled by the pastor's father, the Rev. David Barnett, and the Rev. Lloyd Holloway, First Methodist Church. The senior Barnett will deliver sermons May 31, June 7, 14, 21 and July 19. Holloway will be in the pulpit Aug. 23 and 30.

4th Rosenberg Death Day Set

NEW YORK (AP)—Condemned atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were sentenced Friday to die in the Sing Sing prison electric chair the week of June 15.

This was the fourth time that Federal Judge Irvin R. Kaufman had set the execution date amid a maze of legal defense maneuvers which are still continuing.

Defense counsel unsuccessfully sought to have Judge Kaufman postpone the setting of the date until next Monday.

The Rosenbergs were accused of conspiracy to pass atom bomb secrets to Soviet Russia. They are in the Sing Sing death house.

Judge Kaufman, in originally sentencing them to death, called their crime "worse than murder" because it could possibly lead to the deaths of many innocent persons if an aggressor used the atomic weapon against the United States.

June 7 OTI Baccalaureate

The commencement address, entitled, "Trained People—the Backbone of the Nation," will be given by Earl T. Newbery, secretary of state.

Presentation of graduates will be made by Edward Branchfield, chairman of the State Advisory Committee for OTI; benediction by the Rev. Grady Estes, Calvary Baptist Church.

Nearly 240 students will be graduated at the end of this term from OTI, but only about 127 will be present for the commencement program to receive their diplomas in caps and gowns. The others completed their training earlier in the school year and in most cases, distance prevents their returning for the graduation ceremonies.

Diplomas will be mailed to those graduates who are unable to attend.

From 2 to 5 p. m., Saturday, the day preceding the graduation exercises, women graduates and mothers and wives of men graduates are invited to a tea, sponsored by the OTI Faculty Wives Club at the home of Director and Mrs. Purvine, in Klamath Circle on the campus.

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West Point Rites Begin

WEST POINT, N. Y. (AP)—The U. S. Military Academy's traditional June week ceremonies began Friday.

A review and presentation of athletic awards on the plain were first on the schedule.

More than 500 cadets will receive diplomas at graduation exercises Tuesday, which will end the five-day ceremonies. June Week has attracted a large number of families and friends of the graduating cadets as well as alumni.

Friday's program included awards to outstanding athletes and team captains and letters to members of varsity teams.

D. G. Fuqua, of Little Rock, Ark., was winner of the Army Athletic Association trophy awarded annually to the cadet in the graduating class who rendered the most valuable service to intercollegiate athletics during his cadet career.

F. S. Wilkerson, of Syracuse, Kan., was winner of the Hughes Trophy for the most valuable player on the football team.

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
