chapter directors at an early meeting. More than two years ago there was high interest here in United Fund but final adoption of the plan was not made until the Klamath County Community Chest directors began pushing the plan this year. The directors have said they will vote the chest out of existence and

put its functions under United Fund. Other agencies not included in the chest, such as heart, cancer and palsy societies have agreed to join the united campaign. Basic purpose of United Fund is to have one major campaign annually for all worthwhile agencies rather than several separate drives throughout the year.

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
